

TRAFFIC MEN ARREST 28
SALEM, Mar. 15.—Traffic violators arrested by the state traffic officers during the month of February paid fines aggregating \$1,209, according to a report prepared here today by T. A. Baffey, chief inspector for the law enforcement bureau of the state motor vehicle department.

Washington county reported the largest number of arrests, with fines totaling \$568; Clackamas county was second, with fines amounting to \$295; and Lane county third, with fines aggregating \$275. A total of 98 arrests were made by the state traffic officers.

The state traffic officers traveled 11,600 miles during the month and visited a total of 274 towns and cities.

LEGION SUNDAY TO BE OBSERVED

One Hundred Twelve Legion Posts in Oregon Will Celebrate April 8th as Holiday

In the 112 cities in Oregon where are located posts of The American Legion, April 8 will be commemorated as "American Legion Sunday," it being the Sunday falling closest to the anniversary of the declaration of war against Germany.

The Rev. Frank James of Dallas, department chaplain of The American Legion, in calling attention to a state convention resolution establishing the day which it is hoped will become as distinctive to the legion as Memorial Sunday is to the G. A. R., declared yesterday:

"The thought is that each post in the state will arrange with the ministers of the churches in their town for a union service of all the churches in the name of the Legion, one of the ministers preaching the sermon, the Legion attending in a body. It is hoped that the churches in the town where posts of the Legion are duly organized will accede to the request of the local post for such a service when requested. It is further hoped that every post will make the request and then honor the courtesy of the churches by attending the service arranged in a body and with as strong a representation as possible. The American Legion stands for the highest and the best interests of the community. Many of its members are active in the work of the churches of the various denominations. Such a service will be in harmony with the ideals of the Legion, and wherever it may be held will be distinctly non-denominational. It is therefore hoped that this American Legion memorial Sunday will find a permanent place in the program of the legion posts and the churches of the state."

TEACHERS TO GATHER HERE

Principals and Superintendents of Eastern Oregon to Meet in Conference Here March 24.

Eastern Oregon superintendents and principals will gather in La Grande on March 24th for the purpose of holding their annual conference at which time they will discuss school problems, attend to routine business, and also discuss upon the site for the Eastern Oregon track meet to be held about the middle of May.

Local authorities state that among the questions announced for discussion that gives promise of involving lively debate "Is the Attack Being Made On The Public Schools in Any Sense Justifiable?"

Several prominent Eastern Oregon principals and superintendents, and also superintendents of schools, J. A. Chisholm, are on the program to address the body. Among the above mentioned scheduled speakers are E. G. Bailey, Elgin; Prentiss Brown, Baker; H. B. Howell, Pendleton; and A. C. Hamilton, of La Grande.

INSTITUTE TO OPEN FRIDAY

"Sunday school officers, teachers, parents and others interested in the welfare of children and young people are called to the institute to be conducted by the Rev. P. M. Jasper and the Rev. W. E. Van Noy, both of Portland, state, Rev. G. H. Quigley today. "Mr. Jasper has charge of the Sunday school work for the Oregon conference of the Methodist church, and Mr. Van Noy performs the pastoral office for the Presbyterians. These two experts are co-operating in the institute in La Grande and are inviting members of all denominations to join them in the enterprise."

The first meeting will be held this Friday evening in the Baptist church, when an illustrated lecture will be given by Mr. Jasper on the "Religion of Childhood." The institute will open Sunday afternoon at 2:30. The week-day sessions will convene at 7:30. "The Worker and the Bible," "The Pupil and the Teacher," and "Organization and Administration of the Sunday School," will be the subjects taught. In addition, there will be popular addresses on different phases of work for and with young people. The sessions through the week will be held at the Y. M. C. A. It is expected that all Sunday school officers and teachers will take the course of study.

That Union county and Eastern Oregon are faring very well from the standpoint of appointments under the new governor is to be seen when it is known that aside from Ted Rhinehart's appointment, Will Moore of Pendleton grabbed the insurance commissionership, Johnson Smith of Walla Walla county was made warden of the state prison, Miss Celia Hallman of La Grande is a secretary to the governor, Fred B. Curry is to be made state fair secretary and J. E. Reynolds is to retain his position on the state fair board. Judge Crawford was appointed a member of the board of regents for O. A. C. and Judge William Doby of Baker was named highway commissioner.
