But in the matter of preparing the enormous amount of evidence required by law to connect disability with service, without the Red Cross the task for the Legion would be hopeless. No post of the Legion would be able to find officers who would have time to do this work. Further, trained workers are required. Workers who know what evidence is required by existing law, and who know by experience how to spend money available for this work to the best advantage. I find that the number of cases now being handled by the local chapter of the Red Cross for disabled service men, who are having difficulty in proving that their disability is a result of their service, is appalling. I believe that all members of the Legion and all service men should give to this campaign."
