McKennon in Pendleton—

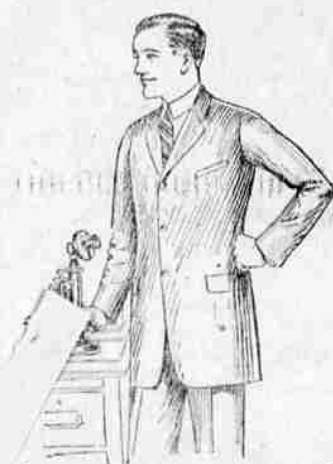
Floyd McKennon of La Grande arrived in Pendleton yesterday on a business mission.—East Oregonian.
