

GRIM REAPER TAKES WM. LEE

Eastern Oregon Pioneer, A Resident of Baker County, Is Dead Following A Short Illness.

NORTH POWDER, Mar. 17.—William Lee, a pioneer settler of Eastern Oregon, passed on at his home in Baker after a sudden attack of illness. The relatives and friends of Mr. Lee were saddened by the news of his untimely death at his home in Baker on March 16, which came as a surprise and a shock to everyone. Mr. Lee came to this country several years ago and was associated for many years with the Lee brothers, large dealers in sheep and well known throughout this country in connection with the sheep industry. He moved to Idaho at one time and went to farming but this did not appeal to him and about a year ago he moved back to Baker and was again working with the sheep. He had been called in from the sheep camp to look after his wife who was sick when he was stricken with the dread disease, pneumonia, and only lived a short time after he had taken ill. Several physicians were called but no human power could help him. He leaves a wife and a ten-year-old son to mourn his loss as well as numerous relatives and friends. As soon as his son, who is now sick with heart trouble is able to travel, the wife and son will take the remains back to the old home in Indiana where he will be laid to rest in the family lot at the old home.

There are sixteen members of the club and all are working hard. They have demonstrated soup and other articles but this is the first time that they have served a big lunch. Lunches will be given by the club at different times during the coming weeks. There will be all kinds of cooking displays at the school fair which will be held at the close of the school term.

The weather is warmer after a long siege of cold snow. In the past few days it is estimated that between eight and nine inches of snow have fallen but the greater part has melted and the ground is bare once more. The ground will be in fine condition for spring work when the weather gets so that the farmers can work.

One of the fifth grade boys had his head cut by glass from a broken window. He was sent to a doctor but no fine particles of glass were found in the wound.

The government has no money to buy food produce in large quantities abroad, and one of the leading commissars has declared that if things do not improve the district is in danger of famine this year.
Soldiers of the Red army are going from house to house begging for food, although this is strictly forbidden by the army regulations. The men complain that they get only one and a half pounds of bread daily and sometimes soup made of fish. They are supposed to get a salary of 25 kopecks a day, but many of them have not been paid for more than three months.

THE HOME GARDEN

What is Home without a Garden?

SEED AND SOWING TECHNIQUE
There is quite a trick to sowing seed evenly and thinly, but it is easily done when you know how.
Professional gardeners who have large quantities of seed to sow usually use a wheel hoe with a seeder attachment or a seeder horse drawn. However, when the seed is to go in boxes or hotbeds or in small quantity, he sows it direct from the packet with a steady motion that drops the seeds evenly and not too thickly in the row made for it.
First of all, after prying the flap loose or cutting the edge of the packet, make a crease in one side of it so that when you hold the edges between the thumb and second finger, the opening will be almost triangular, the edges of the packet being held firmly enough to force the crease apart so that it makes a trough down which the seed may flow.
Now tilt the packet gently and tap it with the forefinger, which will be free above it. With a little practice you can move along a row tapping the packet regularly and the seed will trickle out as fast and as thickly or as slowly and as thinly as you desire.
This is a much easier way than trying to take a pinch of seed between the thumb and forefinger and scatter it.
Where seed is very fine, mix two

for three times its bulk of fine sand with it, and this will serve to distribute it thinly enough. With very fine seeds that pour out too rapidly some such device is necessary. The sand also fills the useful purpose of showing where the seed has been sown if you are broadcasting it and want an even distribution.
With very fine seed no soil covering should be used, but the seed should be pressed firmly into the soil with a brick, smooth block of wood or some similar device. Mere contact with the soil is sufficient to promote germination if proper moisture is provided. Covering with soil is likely to smother the seedlings.

SCHOOL TAXES CUT
