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MILLS HAVE BIG CUT: HOOD RIVER, Ore., Mar. 17. Announcement today by the Oregon Lumber company, which started crews of men to the highland forests of the west fork of Hood River, to prepare camps for early work, indicates a record lumber cut in this county for the year. The company's mill at Dee in former seasons has never sawed more than 24,000,000 feet. By adding 75 men the company will employ about 250 men this season. Record heavy cuts are anticipated by the Mount Hood Milling company, in the upper valley, the Standard Lumber company of Ona Grove and the Wind River Lumber company. The plant of the latter concern, inoperative for several years, has been leased by D. C. Eccles of Portland. Drawing its logs from the headwaters of Wind river in Skamania county, Washington, the Cascade Locks mill is now being made ready for the season's run.
