4-TEAM LEAGUE IS PROPOSED

Baker, Cove, Union and La Grande May Form Baseball League; Crews Will Manage the Pirates.

Meeting in the Home Plate last evening following the boxing card, baseball players and fans laid tentative plans for the coming summer. Lloyd Carter, of Cove, an ardent follower of the national game, was present and broached a plan that met with the approval of those present. Carter's idea in brief was the forming of a four team league, composed of Cove, Union, La Grande and Baker, the playing season to be completed about the middle of July after which time games might be arranged with other teams in other leagues if agreeable. Four or five game series would be played with each team.

Plans Favored.
With no hope of reviving the old six team Intermountain league, this plan looks better than a Baker-La Grande league, which would be about the only thing left. Baker has a fast team coming up this season and La Grande could be able to exhibit the best baseball this season that she has shown in many years. Carter states that Cove needs only a catcher to fill out her nine and also promised that if the league became a fact, which is very probable, that the Cove diamond will be renovated. The Union team is the tentative part in the entire program. If the Federals can get into action again this year, one of the best diamond seasons in many years would be ushered in and Union could muster a strong team without much trouble, incidentally. Union is always noted for having a hard team to beat and has been an important factor in Eastern Oregon baseball ever since the national game was introduced in this section.

If the idea is agreeable to all four teams, a meeting will be arranged shortly to be held probably at Union, which is a central point, at which time a schedule would be made and playing rules for the season adopted and other matters attended to.

Crews to Manage Pirates.
W.C. Crews was appointed manager of the La Grande team last evening which looks good to the fans. Crews, a fast ball player, is an old hand in the game and knows his stuff. Under his management the Pirates, with the material they can readily muster, should have a team that would be hard to beat in any similar league.

CARD TRACK MAN DOES 120 IN 15.1

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., Mar. 17.—Stanford's chances for continued victories in the hurdles in future meets with the University of California, showed definite improvement here recently when Harold Bales, in freshman 150 yard 120-inches high in 15.1 seconds, beating both Lane Falk, winner of the Stanford-California variety event last year, and "Sweet" Leister, winner of the freshman event last month.

Stanford has had intercollegiate and dual meet champions in both hurdle events for the last few years, including in the list such men as Ed House, Ed Murray, Johnny Norton, and Jess Wells, whose individual records have been beaten by none except Earl Thompson, holder of the world's record.

Stanford's chances in the field events took a bound upward when Phil Yelovich, winner of the discus and shot-put in the freshman meet last year, put the lead 42 feet and threw the discus 141.
