ASTORIA IS NOW CONCRETE CITY

Old Mud Flats "Piling" Past History; City to Be Built On Permanent Concrete Base.

ASTORIA, Mar. 19. (Associated Press)—Astoria is now the problem of reconstructing Astoria's business district, which was wrecked by the fire of December 8, 1922, have decided that instead of filling in the streets with earth a better method would be to build concrete viaducts with concrete retaining walls at the sides. The city commission has given its approval to this plan and work has begun.

When Astoria was built over the mud flats along the bank of the Columbia river wood piling was used to support the streets. These street supports served as tunnels for the flames to spread in all directions and were responsible for the extent of the conflagration.

One suggestion of those planning the rebuilding of Astoria was to build retaining walls along the street sides and fill in the streets solidly with earth, but the concrete viaduct plan, according to its proponents, would leave space beneath for laying municipal and public service pipes, wires and conduits, and would be more economical than a solid fill. It was pointed out that it would be fully as safe from fire if heavy concrete retaining walls are built at curb lines and fire curtains at all intersections.

INSTITUTE TO CLOSE FRIDAY

Teachers Training Institute, Conducted By Visiting Pastors, Opened Yesterday.

The first session of the Teachers Training Institute now being conducted by Rev. W. L. Van Nuy, Educational Director for the Presbyterian Church in Oregon, and Rev. F. M. Jasper, Superintendent of Sunday Schools for the Oregon Conference of the Methodist church, was held yesterday afternoon. Because of many other attractions and engagements the attendance was not as large as is expected this evening.

This institute is of such value that those who are interested in efficient work in the realm of religious education will be well repaid for any sacrifice that may be required for a regular attendance at these sessions.

Three courses are offered. Rev. Van Nuy will teach a class from the text book, "The Teacher," by Luther Weigle; Rev. Jasper will teach from the text book, "The Pupil," by Wade Crawford Barclay. Two sessions of each of these classes will be held each evening. Ten class sessions are required for credit. Rev. Ross of the Presbyterian church will give a lecture course from "The Worker and His Bible," by Elmer and Barclay. This will be a very profitable half hour in which all may partake.

The institute is held in the Y. M. C. A. building. The program is as follows: First Class session, 7:30; Second Class session, 8:30; Lecture period, 9:05; Adjournal, 9:35.

Teachers and others interested are advised to register and attend all sessions which is necessary for credit work, but those who cannot do so are welcome to come in at any time and receive whatever information they can.
