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Dunham Wright on Old Oregon Trail Markings

How shall we appropriately mark the Old Oregon Trail, for anything that is worth doing is worth doing well, and as I traveled over this old trail more than sixty years ago at a slow pace, I felt that I know what the conditions of every mile of this old trail was then, asks Dunham Wright. I therefore, suggest it to be laid off into five divisions and at the beginning of each division the old trail shall be spanned by an arch with the number and name of each division inscribed thereon. The name of each division indicating to the traveler of today what each division of this old trail was when first made and traveled by the weary old immigrant, in order that the present day traveler and tourist may know that he is speeding over very sacred ground in every mile of which are silently sleeping, mothers and fathers and dear children in obscure, isolated, and unmarked graves.

Brief Description.
Therefore, apprehend a brief description of what each division of the conditions of the old trail of three-score and more years ago, and what it is today. There should be erected three arches on the Missouri river, one at each starting point, Independence, St. Joseph, and at Council Bluffs, inscribed thereon "This is the first division and starting point of the Platt river and Buffalo division of the Old Oregon Trail." This division then covered a vast stretch of six hundred miles of comparatively level Platt river plain, to the base of the Rockies, uninhabited except for Indians and vast herds of Buffalo.

Now it is one great corn and alfalfa field with thousands of comfortable homes and many thriving towns and villages.

Crosses Rockies.
Spanning the old trail with an arch at the base of the Rockies inscribed No. 2, South Pass and Rocky Mountain division of Old Oregon Trail. Then, crossing as it did the backbone of the world, to the waters of the Pacific ocean, being the route traveled by Gen. Fremont in the early forties, and by the Mormons in 1847, traveling to the Great Salt Lake valley making the Old Oregon Trail a very dear remembrance to those people and their descendants jointly with the first old settlers of Old Oregon.

Now we come to Big Sandy, the third division of the Old Oregon Trail and known as the Great American Desert for several hundred miles to Powder river. This division brought more hardships, heartaches, grief and sorrow than all other divisions combined for it was on this division that most of the cruel Indian massacres perpetrated and the deadly cholera scourge of 1852 raged, making it a veritable burying ground. I feel safe to say, at least two-thirds of the estimated persons per mile for the length of this trail, are silently sleeping in isolated unmarked graves in this division. The roadside was literally strewn with piles of glistening bones of faithful beasts of burden that had fallen exhausted and exhausted. So we feel it appropriate to name this the "Graveyard and the Great American Desert Division" of the Old Oregon Trail.

Conditions Changed.
What is this division today? Why man has converted water from old Snake river and other mountain streams and has caused the desert to bloom as the rose until almost the whole length of it is one alfalfa field, fruit orchard and potato patch with good comfortable homes everywhere you look, dotted with thriving towns and villages which were once known as the Great American desert.

Commencing near where Baker is now located, the air weary Pilgrims looking down on miles of green pastures, along the Powder river, truly an oasis in the desert; to greet the eye after emerging from hundreds of miles of burned desert waste. Then on to Ladd hill, looking down on the beautiful Grande Ronde valley all a vast green expanse of country most beautiful to behold; a panorama at your feet where human and beast can rest in comfort. Crossing the Blue mountains to the Umatilla river, Wild Horse, Walla Walla river, Butter and Birch creeks, all looking good and habitable.

We name this division for its beautiful green valleys, its intervening mountains and the oasis, Division No. 4, or the Blue Mountain Division of the Old Oregon Trail.

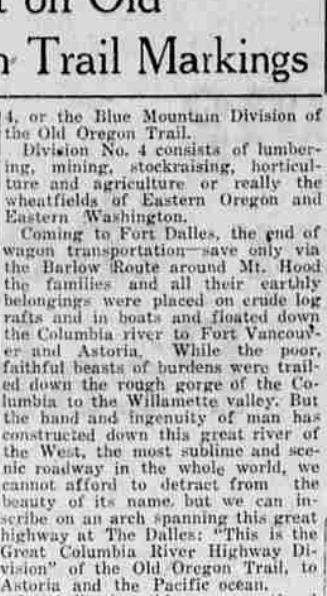
Division No. 4 consists of lumbering, mining, stockraising, horticulture and agriculture or really the wheatfields of Eastern Oregon and Eastern Washington.

Coming to Fort Dalles, the end of wagon transportation—save only via the Barlow Route around Mt. Hood the families and all their earthly belongings were placed on crude rafts and in boats and floated down the Columbia river to Fort Vancouver and Astoria. While the poor, faithful beasts of burdens were trailed down the rough gorge of the Columbia to the Willamette valley. But the hand and ingenuity of man has constructed down this great river of the West, the most sublime and scenic roadway in the whole world, we cannot afford to detract from the beauty of its name, but we can inscribe on an arch spanning this great highway at The Dalles; "This is the Great Columbia River Highway Division" of the Old Oregon Trail, to Astoria and the Pacific ocean.

In dedicating this great national highway with all its modern improvements of four score years, to the memory of the first old trail-blazers and pathfinders, that their young and rising generations may appreciate their grand work in habitating the wilderness and establishing civilization, churches and schools and laying the foundation of our great and growing state.

Advocates Exposition.
Let it be done by holding an Old Trail Exposition at the Metropolis of Oregon in 1927. That all states through which this grand old trail passes may have the pride and privilege of contributing to the exposition, to perpetuate the names and work of this grand army of old pioneers.

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ROADS TO TAP OIL AND COAL

BILLINGS, Mont., Mar. 21.—An area in southeastern Montana, approximately 150 miles wide and 170 miles long, one of the largest in the United States without a railroad, has prospects of three lines which will tap both oil and coal fields.

A branch line, which will extend 35 miles south from Forsyth, Mont., to the headwaters of Armells creek has been surveyed by the Northern Pacific railroad, and announcement has been made that construction will begin as soon as materials can be put on the ground. This line will open the coal fields in Rosebud county.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy, it is reported, is buying right of way for a line which will run eastward from some point on its tracks between Billings, Mont., and Sheridan, Wyo., into the two counties in the southeastern corner of Montana, adjacent to South Dakota.

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OSAGE ORANGE TOUGHEST WOOD

TUZSON, Ariz., Mar. 21.—A report on durability tests of the various native woods of this country, received recently by local forest service officials, discloses the fact that Osage Orange, which is extensively used in Arizona as a hedge, holds first place in this regard, while pine, fir and juniper, found in quantity in this state, made a creditable showing.

The experiments, made for the purpose of ascertaining what native woods, without special treatment and the greatest durability, were conducted at the forest products laboratory maintained by the Forest Service at Madison, Wis., where all kinds of experiments with forest timber are carried on.

On a basis of 100 per cent for white oak, according to the report.

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Osage Orange was found to rate at from 200 to 300 per cent, making it especially valuable as fence post material, where length of life is desirable. Of the other woods found in Arizona, yellow pine was rated at from 35 to 40 per cent and Douglas fir at from 75 to 85 per cent, while juniper showed a good degree of durability.
