BASKETBALL TEAM FETED

Owen Price Is Elected Captain for Ensuing Season; Nine Letters Awarded.

Final curtains were last night lowered on the 1922-23 La Grande high school basketball season. Gathering at the Country club, the nine lettermen, accompanied by their lady friends, and officials of the team and members of the high school faculty, seated at a delicious banquet, officially ushered out all but memories with the awarding of letters to the members, and the election of next season's captain.

Owen Price, who made his basketball letter for the first time this season, one of the youngest members of the squad, was honored by being elected captain. Price, though his first year at the court game, steadily improved throughout the season, playing possibly one of his best games in the final Baker-La Grande contest. Next year he should be a veritable whirlwind in the court.

Letters were awarded to nine members of the squad as follows: Captain Glenn Metcalf, center; Bernard Hummel, Owen Price, Ray Lynch, co-captains; James Coker, Clifford Rockland, Floyd Smith, Joe Funk and Robert Garrity, guards.

Joe "Skeet" Reynolds presided as toastmaster at the banquet, and, in addition to the team, Cecil Snow, coach, E. D. Towler, principal of the high school, and A. C. Hampton, superintendent of the La Grande schools, were present. A. V. Lindgren, assistant coach, was unable to be present due to illness.

Following the termination of the banquet, the basketball boys and a number of guests spent the remainder of the evening until the hour of midnight dancing. Music was furnished by an orchestra composed of Abbie Green, piano, Andrew Luxon, Jr., cornet and Kenneth Eckler, saxophone. All who attended were enthusiastically of the opinion that the dance was one of the most enjoyable affairs of the season.

Baker Will Probably Get E. O. Track Meet

Several important matters relative to Eastern Oregon high school athletics will be discussed at the Superintendents' and Principals' Convention to be held here Saturday. Among them will be the advancing of a proposition relative to neutral referees for all interscholastic official games, one relative to a competitive district basketball tourney following the completion of the regular season's play, and also the awarding of the Eastern Oregon Track Meet. The latter will very likely go to Baker. Pendleton got it last year, Union the year before, and La Grande in 1920, making it Baker's turn to be host to the visiting track teams.

Freddie Hart To Meet Lee Morrissey Here

Failure to secure two first class heavyweights for the main events in the next boxing card is not worrying Manager Ed Ford today. For in place of the contemplated big boys he has completed arrangements for the headliner to consist of two welterweights, both fighters of renown, Lee Morrissey, of Idaho Falls, who fought and K. O.'d Sailor Manning here a few months ago, will meet Freddie Hart, Los Angeles welterweight contender, in the main event. Two more welterweights, Charley Weise and Baron DeGreeve, of La Grande, will meet in the semi-windup, to be either six or an eight round special event.

Morrissey is well known to La Grande fans and is a good boy. Hart, although not having fought here recently, is good. He will fight in a main event in Portland on April 6th, three days following his scrap here, which is scheduled for Tuesday, April 3rd. Hart recently knocked out Collier Stoop, in Portland, in two rounds who is rated high among coast battlers.

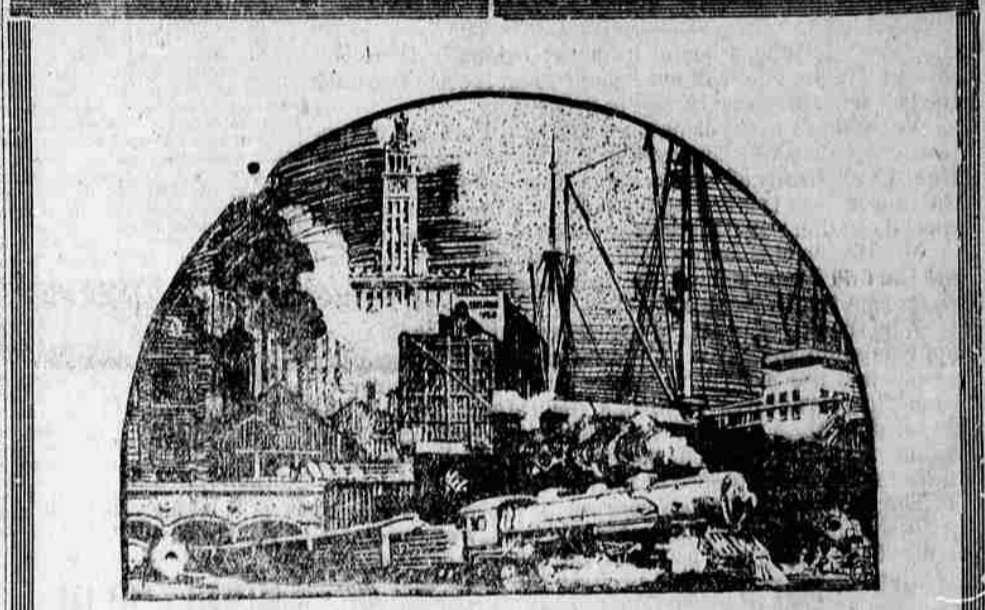
