Average Living Expenses. At U. of O. \$60 Per Month

EUGENE, Mar. 22.—The average living expenses of a University of Oregon student, according to a recent survey made by the Oregon Daily Evening, student daily paper. This sum is not paid by all the students in the university for there are some who pay less than this amount but these figures represent an approximate estimate of the general living expenses as obtained in the survey.

The general average for the living expenses in fraternities and sororities on the campus was found to be \$37.50 for the monthly board bill. To this sum was added incidentals such as laundry, fees, clothing and miscellaneous expenses amounting to at least \$22.50 per month. Living costs to residents of Friendly Hall, men's dormitory, are slightly lower but the majority of men not living in fraternities or the hall pay as much as do fraternity men.
