## NIGHT FLYING FOR U. S. MAIL

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Mar. 24.—Night mail service between Chicago, Cheyenne, and the Pacific coast, as contemplated by the air mail service officials, will be entirely practicable, according to Edward Richards, superintendent of the local field.

After his return from North Platte, Neb., where he went recently in connection with the experiment, Mr. Richards said that for a distance of fifteen miles east of North Platte, beacon lights were placed at three-mile intervals to test the practicability of the proposed new service.

The lights, which burn acetylene gas, are located in fields and meadows along the route, and will burn 40 days without further attention, after they are lighted. The lights are on pedestals and are five feet in height.

In making a test, Pilot Knight "got lost" as a part of the plan of trying out the "guide light" system, but found his way again without difficulty, by following the lights. It is said that most of the guiding lights are located in the vicinity of good landing places, and in case of a forced landing, the pilots will be able to find the landing fields by the aid of their powerful searchlights.

Night flying will become part of the regular service about June, 1923, according to present plans.

Due to stricter study of plants the present tendency is towards the improvement of present strains rather than the miscellaneous introduction of new varieties without distinct differences from older sorts.
