## MANIAC IS FOILED, COMMITS SUICIDE

HAILEY, Idaho, Mar. 24.—Folled in his efforts to kill Miss Agnes Vorberg, with whom he was infatuated, William Smith, 40, committed suicide by shooting himself in the mouth in the basement of the Vorberg home, one mile west of here, where he was cornered by Sheriff Clements and Deputy Sheriff Gibson Friday noon before killing himself. Smith fired one shot at the officers, without effect, and evidenced other maniacal characteristics by shooting at dogs belonging to the Vorberg family, and by breaking up furniture in the home where he had barricaded himself. He had formerly been an employe of the Vorbergs.
