WESTERN UNION SENDS DELEGATE

The Western Union Telegraph company, at the solicitation of Miss Anne Morgan, chairman of the American Committee for Devastated France, has agreed to enter delegates in a Good-Will election to be held under the auspices of the committee as a result of which election a number of American business men will be sent to France by the American Committee.

The object of the election is to create a fund to enable the American committee to complete the work which it began in France in 1917 and also to give the representatives of the people who subscribe to this fund an opportunity to inspect the work at first hand.

Delegates are elected by votes cast at ten cents per vote (anyone can cast as many votes as they like for any candidate) and the funds received will support contributions to the work of the American Committee.

The Western Union Telegraph company will endeavor to elect two delegates from the Pacific Coast. Candidates have been selected on popular vote of their associates. Western Union employees in the Pacific Northwest have named Ruth Thorsen of Everett, Crook County, Superintendent of the staff at the Pacific Northwest cable station. Her address is 204 Gateway Exchange Building, Seattle, Wash., where checks can be mailed. She will compete with candidates named by 250 fishermen and log skippers. Voters will be selected from as many as 2500 names and individuals in the states of Oregon and Washington as can be reached by April 8, at which time the election closes.

The campaign is in charge here by the local chairman, E. E. Brown, of La Grande, and is being directed from New York, where a number of other campaigns are being conducted.

WILL TAKE UP VITAL MATTERS

Commercial Bodies, to Meet In April at Eugene, Will Thresh Out Several Problems.

La Grande, Mar. 24.—Land settlement, tourist travel, and the future of the timber, lumber, livestock and horticultural industries in Oregon will be discussed by state chambers of commerce and commercial club secretaries who attend the annual short course to be conducted under the auspices of the school of time, new administration of the University of Oregon at Eugene April 2 to 6, inclusive. The short course program has been announced by Dean E. C. Robbins.

W. D. B. Dodson, manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce; A. S. Indley, secretary-manager of the Sacramento (Calif.) Chamber of Commerce; Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary of the Northwest Tourist association, and other leaders in chamber of commerce work will be among the speakers. The general discussion this year will be on "State Development."

The State Association of Commercial Secretaries will hold their annual business meeting on the evening of April 5, electing officers and directors for the coming year. The program follows:

The annual income available for the foundation's expenditures amounts to between \$5,000,000 and \$6,000,000.
