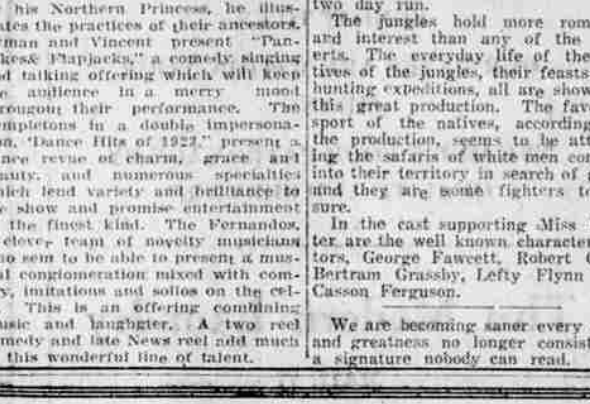
A CARNIVAL IN COLOR & LAUGHTER WILL BE PRESENTED AT THE ARCADE THEATRE SUNDAY.
