LA GRANDE HIGH TRACK CALL OUT

First Workout of the Season Is Being Held This Evening; Track Schedule Is Announced.

Principal E. B. Towler, temporarily in charge of track during the illness of A. V. Lindgren, coach, issued the first track call of the season this morning. La Grande high has several point winners of last year's team left over to form a nucleus of the squad and with two more expected to turn out tonight in the first light workout, hopes are being held for a winning Blue and White track team this year. This week will be mainly spent in light preliminary workouts and distance running to build up the muscles and prepare for the more intensive work soon to follow.

The track schedule is now practically completed and promises La Grande possibly three meets here. The class track meet will be held here April 7th and on April 14th, a "final" meet will be held with Union. Whether the meet will be held at Union or here has not been definitely settled. Baker high school will come here on April 21, and the week following, April 28th, La Grande will go to Pendleton. The Eastern Oregon meet to be held at Baker May 12th, will close the season.

The annual county track meet may be and may not be held this year. The matter has not yet been decided but will be at a later time. If held, the meet will probably be May 5th.

BAKER WINS FROM LA GRANDE SCOUTS

The La Grande Boy Scouts, who are now engaged in a series of basketball games with the Baker Scouts for the juvenile championship of Eastern Oregon, lost the advantage they gained here when they defeated Baker two weeks ago, by losing to the Baker Scouts at Baker Saturday evening by the score of 36 to 13. A deciding game will be played at some future time, which has not yet been announced, the winner to be undisputed champion.

The score at the end of the first half was 17 to 9 in favor of Baker and in the last half Baker scored and scored 19 points while the locals were gathering four.


