EXPLAINS DREAD SLEEPING MALADY

PORTLAND, Mar. 28.—The majority of cases of encephalitis lethargica, popularly known as sleeping sickness, are not in reality sleeping sickness, but are included in a group of diseases and disorders compiled by the United States public health service.

A large percentage of the cases of sleeping sickness investigated by the federal health authorities proved to be cerebro-spinal meningitis, brain abscess, tuberculosis, meningitis, epilepsy, poliomyelitis, hysteria or acute alcoholism.

This report confirms the findings announced some time ago by City Health Officer Parrish, who has declared that the large number of cases of sleeping sickness reported in Portland could not be associated with the real sleeping sickness that swept through certain regions of Africa a few years ago.

"The disease," the federal report states, "appears to be only difficultly communicable. Not a single secondary case is known to have occurred in the immediate families of patients investigated by this bureau, although not less than 300 were exposed."

"The fatality is rather high. Of 150 cases studied, death resulted in 44 or 29 per cent."

Pendleton Concerns.

Are Affected Due To Changes To Be Made

PENDLETON, Mar. 28.—A business change which will result in changes of location being made by Greulich & Matlock, The Economy Drug Co. and W. A. McClelland & Co. has been reduced to terms of contracts, according to statements made by the principals today.

Under an arrangement made between Dr. L. U. Temple and Thomas Young, Mr. Young will take over the present location of the Arcade Theater.
