CUT HIGHWAY IN ROCKY CAPE

WALLOWA, Mar. 28.—An interesting engineering operation is going on at the Johnson Contract Co. camp a mile east of Lostine. In order to make the highway grade between the railroad and the hill near the Wade place, it is necessary to remove between twelve and fifteen thousand cubic yards of solid rock. Operations were started by taking a corner out of the hill with the grade at the bottom. A tunnel seven by eight feet in size was then started, and has now gone forty-five feet along the grade. The rock is timbered with an opening at the top. Rock is then blasted along the gash running in the same direction and above the mouth of the tunnel. The pieces slide down the cut into one cars below. The rock is then taken back over the temporary tracks and used as a fill for the highway to be built. Three men with a machine drill extend the tunnel about five feet every night, while ten men blast and break the rock by day. The Johnson Contract Co. has sublet the rock cutting to Freeland and Co., only maintaining the bank and dining houses, and incidentally supervising the work. The work will be speeded up by putting crews at both ends of the two rock cuts. Thus the work will be increased four times with forty men employed.

PLUMBERS PLAN TO START SCHOOL

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 28.—Barber colleges and schools for auto mechanics have been in existence for many years and now plumbers of Spokane plan to develop apprentices or establishing a school for plumbers. The plan, which was presented to the school board of Spokane recently by J. E. McCormick for the master plumbers, will be handled under the Smith-Hughes plan if accepted. The course includes four years' work in mathematics, physics, chemistry, hydraulics, blue print reading and drafting. The apprentices must be American citizens, at least 16 years old, have completed the eighth grade, and must agree to serve at least four years as apprentices, beginning at \$7.50 and increasing to \$15 a week at the end of the four years. The master plumbers will furnish steady employment, instructors and tools. The school board has taken the matter under advisement.

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An Abrasive

Being hard and gritty—hard enough to score cylinders it acts as an abrasive, wearing cylinders, pistons, and rings. It prevents valves from seating properly. Compression is thus lost. Small particles become incandescent, causing pre-ignition, which results in "knocking" and lost power. Spark plugs, becoming coated with it, are short-circuited, and miss.

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
