POLICE FORCE INCREASED

PORTLAND, Mar. 28—A complete
 reorganization of the Portland police
 bureau with the establishment of a
 strong additional patrol during the
 night hours, the establishment of two
 additional booths, the reduction of the
 size of the detective division and the
 placing of 20 men now in office and
 other details into patrol service, will
 be put into effect April 1.

Chief of police Jenkins announced
 the new system yesterday after hav-
 ing spent several weeks studying the
 situation, revising plans and checking
 over the changes that could and
 should be made to strengthen the
 city's protection. The shake-up is
 probably the most radical made in the
 police bureau in many years.
