PAYMASTER SPENDS BILLION.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Mar. 29.—E. A. Van Wynn, paymaster at the headquarters of the Southern Pacific company here, claims to be one of the most lavish spenders in the world. In the twenty years he has been signing the company's checks he has paid out more than \$1,100,000,000. Altogether, in the twenty-year period, Van Wynn has signed more

than 12,000,000 checks, his monthly average being at present 115,000. The value of the checks paid out in a single month totals more than \$7,250,000.

In signing checks Van Wynn uses a duplicating signature device which enables him to write his name five times at once.

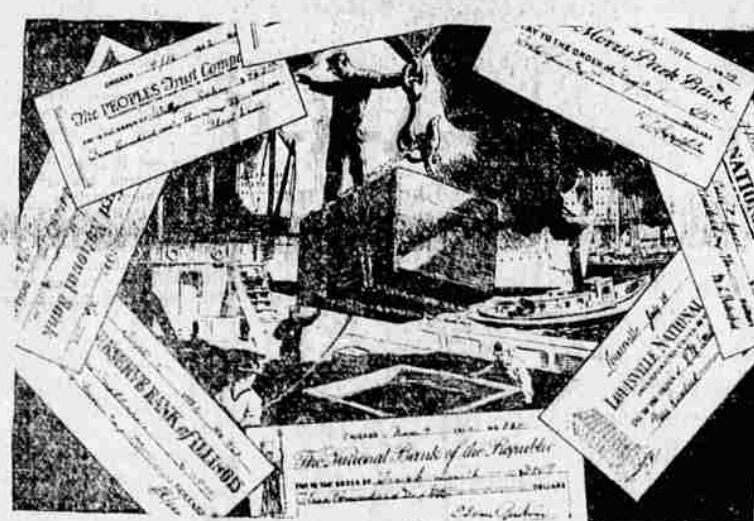
