COVE PIONEER LADY IS DEAD

COVE, Mar. 29.—The funeral services for Mrs. Mary Koger were held at the Baptist church on Monday, March 26. Rev. Fred L. Post officiated and the remains were laid to rest in Rose Ridge cemetery. Mrs. Koger, whose maiden name was Mary Boyles, was born in Woodville, Ill. August 20, 1848. In 1867 she was married to Salmon C. Sackelder. Three children were born to this union, one of whom is still living. An August 1871 she was married to John Koger, at Cove, Oregon, where they lived for many years. Four children were born to them, three of whom are living: John at Granger, Wash., Anna McGatch at The Dalles, Oregon, and Pearl Jasper at Caldwell, Idaho. Mrs. Koger was taken seriously ill in November of last year, an illness from which she never rallied. She was a life-long Christian and is mourned by a large circle of friends. For some years she has lived with her daughter at Caldwell, Idaho, and it was there that she passed away on March 24.
