Every man who answers the diamond call this year is going to get an equal chance and with many local players of ability on hand, in addition to ex-Pirates, it looks as if the competition will be more than keen for every position. Changes are strong that several who made the team last year may be hard pressed or even boosted out of their places by some of the newer recruits and with such competition, which means that the team will be working throughout the season as never before, a first class nine is assured.

Briefly speaking, in the words of Manager Crows, "every man who turns out this year will be given an equal chance. The team will be selected without partiality and he who shows up best in practice will be given the call, no matter what past records show. We want a fighting, hard working team this year, and the man that has never played under former lineups will have just as much a chance of making the team, if he shows ability, as the old-timers have. Quality is our view, and from the quantity of players that appear, nothing but quality will be selected. Every man, even after he makes the team, has got to keep going full blast or another man will take his place."
