HOT LAKE COW MAKES RECORD

A very creditable record of milk and butter production of a purebred Holstein cow of this community is announced by the Advanced Registry office of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

At the age of four years and five months, Hazelwood Josephine Kornadyke, owned by W. T. Phy, Hot Lake, Oregon, produced 20,570.5 lbs. of milk and 750.94 lbs. of butterfat in three hundred and sixty-five days.

This butterfat production is equivalent to 938.7 lbs. of butter.

The Advanced Registry office supervises official and semi-official milk and butter tests made of purebred Holstein cows. A certain standard of production is required, according to age and length of test, before the cow is admitted to the Advanced Registry.
