Spanish War Vets Meet—Messrs. Huron, Coolidge, Hitter, Williams, Brenonhalf and Carter, members of the Spanish War Veterans camp at La Grande, visited the local camp at Baker last evening where arrangements were effected to hold a reunion and banquet at the Union hotel, April 25, in commemoration of the 25th anniversary of the declaration of war against Spain.

An invitation will be extended to all eligible veterans of this war to join with these two camps in this reunion and it is expected that a large number of these old veterans will get together to talk over the experiences of a quarter century ago.

About 30 members attended the meeting of Frederick Funston Camp last evening, after which a chicken feed was enjoyed by those present.

Indian Agency Not To Be Sold—The Indian agency school buildings will not be sold nor will the agency office be moved to Pendleton according to Joe Craig, Indian interpreter who returned recently from a trip to Washington. The boarding school for Indian children will either be reopened or else the property will be converted into a hospital for Indians, says Craig.

Accompanied by Captain Sumlin Joe Craig took the matter up personally with Commissioner of Indian Affairs Burke in the presence of Congressman Sinnott and others. After listening to the local delegation Commissioner Burke said the order to sell the property would be recalled. General Hugh Scott, who visited the agency last year, recommended that the school be reopened and his report said that the supervisor for the district concurred in

Crawford of La Grande, who during the political campaign of last fall was the campaign manager for Governor Pierce. Judge Crawford is now a regent of Oregon Agricultural college, having been appointed to take the place left vacant by the governor when he took the chair of the chief executive of the state. Carnival During Stock Show Is Dispensed With; Local Attraction to Be Featured

UNION, April 2.—Wednesday evening at the Union hotel there was a joint meeting of the Commercial club and the Union Stock Show association. The club meeting came first with President Hess in the chair. The members are interested in starting the boy scout movement and were hosts to a number of the boys that evening. Plans were laid to provide a leader and start the work. Mayor Trippler of Cove was present and discussed the Union-Cove road situation. He announced that Cove would see that the work was completed and road made in good shape. John Deane, another Cheviote, gave an interesting talk about boosting in California, where he has recently been in a visit. After a short intermission the livestock show meeting was called to order by President Withycombe. All committee reported their departments as in good shape and moving along as well as could be expected. No outside carnival will be secured for the evening this year. Many of the people of Union objected to the fact that a carnival carries away hundreds of dollars and leaves nothing worth while with the town. Besides this, many believe that the moral influence of most of the carnivals is the wrong kind of influence to put before our young people. Instead of the traveling carnival, a local attraction, possibly some horse show from the neighboring towns, will be the evening attraction on the street. The new gym will be used for dances during the entire week of the stock show and the stockmen's convention. Hurd maple flooring has been ordered for the gymnasium and the manual training boys will start putting it down right away, so as to have it finished before school closes. Several organizations, including the Commercial club, the stock show and the firemen's union have guaranteed the payment for the floor.

 The deforestation of our forest, by cutting and slashing its timber for gain. This deforestation is not necessary. When it is considered that good mercantile timber is really past its usefulness in the forest. Old trees can be seen everywhere dying and standing there to rot or fall to the ground, being a bigger menace to forest than the axe of the well behaved lumbermen, because it then makes regular fire traps to eat up little and big trees. By a conventional cutting of commercial timber, by not cutting too small, and burning all slashings after operation, the standing trees are more valuable as lumber than standing in the forest. There is also enough black pine and tamarack, not counting the innumerable other species of scrub timbers remaining to insure the so-called water sheds for our waters to irrigate with. All it needs is a strict observance of our forest laws, letting our strongest industry bring good to the community instead of hindering.
