OLD EGYPTIANS HAD LEAGUE OF NATIONS

"The Loves of Pharaoh" Shows How
It Was Smashed

Call it league of nations, or asso-
ciations of nations, or any such
phrase, and hail it if you like, as
a brand new idea in international
relations, designed to insure peace
and prosperity.

The special Article X of debate
between an Egyptian Pharaoh and a
king of Ethiopia was Makeda, dusky
daughter of the latter. He had made
her the covenant of his league of
nations and insisted that the corner-
stone of the new international struc-
ture be inscribed "Love my league,
love my daughter."

But Pharaoh couldn't get over his
liking for blondes, particularly the
pretty serving maid to the Ethiopian
princess. So the kings fell out and
the league went smash, and one of
the biggest wars resulted that ever
a movie camera man recorded.

This legend of love, ambition and
fighting over a girl is the most re-
cent film romance directed by Ernest
Lubitsch, creator of "Passion" and
"Deception." He had used 112,000
persons, by far the largest number
of extras ever photographed, to tell
this story of "The Loves of Pharaoh"
a Paramount picture which will be
shown at the Arcade theater next
Monday. Emil Jannings, who was
the king in "Deception," Paul Wex-
ner, who played "The Golem," Har-
ry Liedke, hero of "The Last Pay-
ment," and Dagmar Servaes, a new
blond beauty, play the leading roles.

SHERRY'S LAST DAY

For "Trifling Women," the latest
Rex Ingram production for Metro,
now at the Sherry theater, two gi-
gantic sets have been erected—a
great castle with five huge towers,
measuring in diameter twenty-six
feet, rearing into the air two hundred
and fifty feet. The frontage of the
castle measuring along its base four
hundred feet. The gardens laid out
for the castle approach are three
hundred and twenty feet in depth
and cover an acre of ground. Elab-
orate planting, statuary of rare
beauty, iridescent peacocks strutting
about, costly fountains have made
this set a miracle of gorgeousness
and beauty probably unrivaled in the
annals of filmdom. The estimated
cost of the set is \$50,000.

The second set, known as the Sor-
cerer's Tower, is only a little less
ambitious. It is a single tower, soar-
ing one hundred and twenty feet into
the air, with several turrets, a solid
gloomy structure of curious shape
and menacing design. It is here that
the tremendous climax of the picture
"Trifling Women" is staged, with
the blood-red sunset throwing the
tower into black relief. The tower
has an irregular circumference but
at its greatest base measures fifty
feet. The estimated cost is 20,000.
"Trifling Women" was written,
adapted and directed by Rex Ingram.
In the cast are Ramon Novarro,
Barbara La Marr, Lewis Stone, Ed-
ward Connelly, Thelma Mack, Pom-
eroy Cannon and others. The pro-
ducing is the work of John P. Seltz.
Starrett Ford was production man-
ager.

sible.

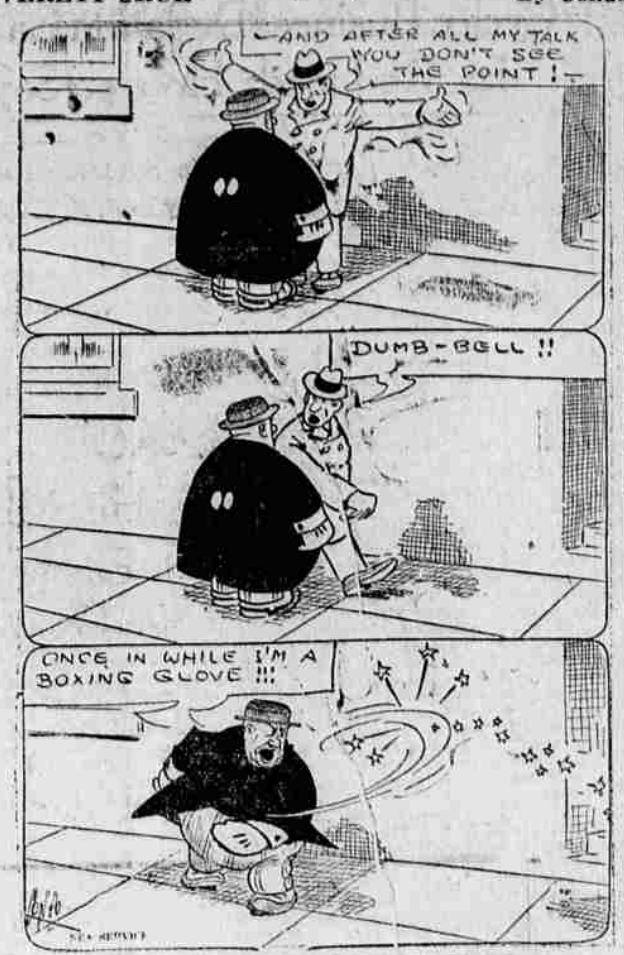
The Victorian dresses, with their
