

GREAT LAKES EXPECT A LARGE IRON YIELD

DULUTH, Minn., Mar. 31.—Activity of ore producing mines in the Lake Superior district is considered an evidence of the prediction made by operators that 55,000,000 tons of iron ore will be shipped from the dis-

trict this year, an estimate just 5,000,000 tons short of the record, and more than 10,000,000 tons higher than the tonnage handled last year. Railroads are ordering new equipment; day and night shifts of workers are repairing cars and docks; underground mines are working full shifts to increase their stockpiles, and on the open pit properties great

chaumes are being opened to make way for the removal of the mineral. Vessel concerns report that their fleets are being made ready to sail from winter quarters just as soon as ice conditions permit. Alaska's psychological moment to press her claims to statehood would be during the first hot wave.
