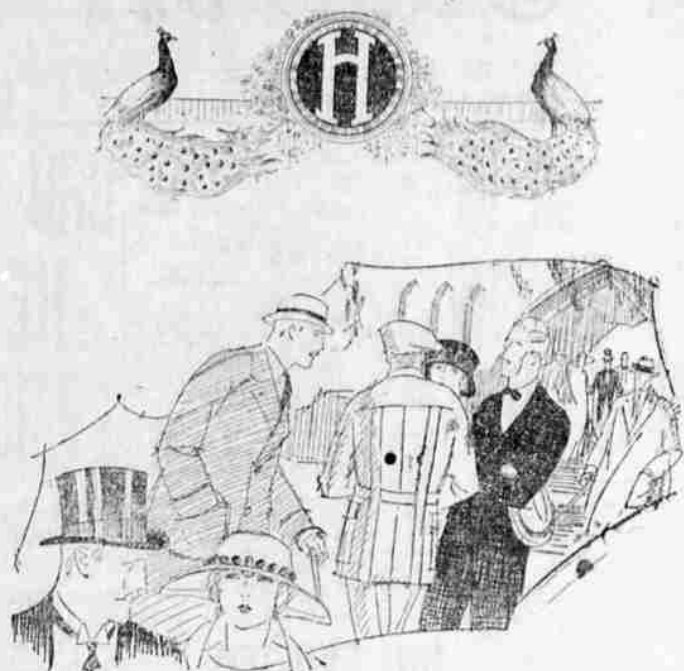




Men and Young Men's Smart Suits

COVE, Apr. 4.—The body of John Davis, who died in Portland March 24, was brought to Cove for burial. Funeral services were read at the Baptist church, Rev. Fred L. Post officiating, and the body was laid to rest in Rose Ridge cemetery, John Davis was born in Summerville, Penn., in 1844. He was married to Lucy Corner in 1864. From this union eight children were born, all of whom survive with the exception of one son who was killed in a railroad accident in 1915. The family came to Cove in 1909, living here four years.
