MORRISEY AND HART FIGHT A 10-ROUND DRAW

In a Jack-hustle boxing card, that only partially came up to the expectations of La Grande fans, Lee Morrissey, of Idaho Falls, and Freddie Hart, of Los Angeles, fought a ten-round draw in the main event last night in the fair theatre.

In the semi-final, between Charlie Weiss and Baron McGraw, both of this city, Weiss won in the third round when McGraw gave up after attempting to claim a foul which medical examination failed to prove.

In the two four-round preliminaries as first, between Steward and Davis, went to a draw, and the second, between Chas. Clapp and Kid Meloy, was won by Clapp by decision. Kincaid, who fought on the card, was not present. Clapp did not develop the decision and a draw would have been the only possible way to look at the matter.

Hart Fast.
In the main event, California met the son of a gun from Oregon, and at first it looked as though the affair would be a real battle. Morrissey went fairly strong in the first round, doing the greater share of the fighting. In the second round Hart came back and showed a little more of his boxing ability. He was a little better in the third round, but in the fourth round the fight was treated to a display of boxing, clinching and head-butting, with only a few occasional spurts of boxing.

Finally Hart was a shade the cleverer of the two, but that was offset by Morrissey's punch, which landed quite frequently and with effect. Up to the end of the fight, the opinion that Hart had a slight edge and just as many were sure that Morrissey should have been given honors. His hair, however, held up both fighters' hands in the conclusion.

Semi-Final Slugging Match.
The semi-final, which it should be noted, was a real slugfest, was won by Weiss in the third round. In the first round, once for the count of nine, both boys were slugging heartily, each landing some hard blows. The second round was clearly all Weiss's. In the third round Weiss sent McGraw down for a count of eight. McGraw claiming a foul. The fight was called during a medical examination at McGraw's was sent back into the ring. He came back and fought Weiss in a short count. Weiss then started on an offensive that drove McGraw to the ropes several times, whereupon McGraw conceded the victory to his opponent.

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BIG ROCK SALT DEPOSIT FOUND

MOSCOW, Ida., April 4.—A rock salt deposit said to have a total thickness of 175 feet and a little more than 500 feet below the surface has been located in southeastern Idaho, in the eastern part of Garfield county, according to an announcement received by Virgil R. D. Kirkham, geologist with the state bureau of mines faculty. The discovery was made by an operator drilling a well to test the oil structures in the area, which is said to be promising. Samples of the newly discovered deposit have been analyzed and show exceptional purity. Some of the beds are more than 20 feet thick, and with the area in which the brine springs are found, exceed 40 square miles in area. Analyses indicate that the salt will average from five to eleven dollars a ton.

"Since the earliest days of western emigration, the existence of salt in that area has been known," said Professor Kirkham, commenting on the discovery. "The Lander trail, a cut-off which joined the Old Oregon trail at Blackfoot, was built through that part of what is now Garfield county, because those salt springs existed there."

"These salt deposits may be mined by drilling wells, forcing water into the salt beds and pumping it back to the surface to be evaporated or sinking a shaft and mining the salt like coal."

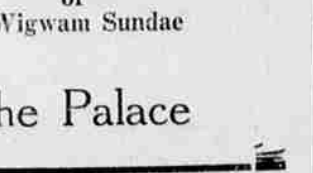
