"LITTLE LORD FAUNTLEROY" A GREAT ACHIEVEMENT

Opening of Latest Pickford Pro-
duction a Delightful Occasion.

There came to the Sherry last
night for a two-day run, a photo-
play that left a profound impression
on the audience. It was Mary Pick-
ford's "Little Lord Fauntleroy," the
most appealing and at the same
time one of the most perfect photo-
plays ever to pass through a pro-
jecting machine. The mingled
laughter and tears, accentuated by
resounding applause, acclaimed as
"America's Sweetheart" goddess

terpretation of the role of Dearest

had all but gone a-glimmering.

Among the players those inter-
pretations do much to make "Little
Lord Fauntleroy" the crowning
screen achievement are Claude Gil-
lingwater, as the Earl, Joseph J.
Dowling, as Havisham the solicitor,
Colin Kenny, as Bevis, the Earl's
eldest son, and the three cronies,
Mrs. McGinty played by Kate Price,
Mr. Hobbs by James A. Marcus, and
Dick by Frederick M. Maltesta.
Others are Rose Dione as Minna,
the pretender, Francis Marion, as her
son, and Madame de Bodaniere in
the role of Mrs. Higgins.

screen.

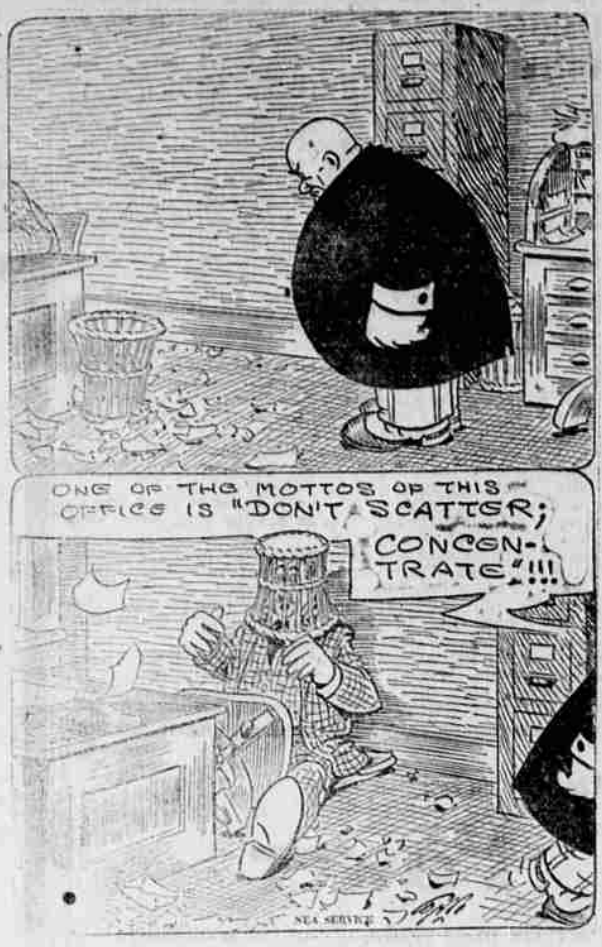
Constance Talmadge finally secured
