Portland Man Here—Mr. Terwilliger, of the Terwilliger and Murphy Co., of Portland, who has been in La Grande several days installing a set of kilns in the Bowman-Hicks Lumber Co., left this morning for points in California where he will spend a month attending to business.

Pat Foley Here—Pat Foley, owner of a hotel at The Dalles and the Hotel Patrick at Heppner, Oregon, and formerly in the hotel business here, is in La Grande for a few days visiting his mother, Mrs. J. E. Foley, and his grandmother, Mrs. Johanna Gauff.

Must Sign Permits—According to Floyd Kendall, forest ranger, all sheep men who take out permits to graze sheep on the Umatilla National forest ranges are requested before securing them, to sign an agreement whereby the sheep men or their employees shall follow the forest service regulations in regards to the use of the open method of herding, in rendering aid in extinguishing any fires, repairing roads and trails which are damaged by their stock, and to observe sanitary requirements in the disposition of carcasses and the burial of camp refuse. If violations of these regulations are practiced the grazing permit will be forfeited.

Sanitation Expected—Looking to a better year than ever in the national forests in regards to their use by pleasure seekers and tourists, the district ranger of the Grande Range Ranger District of the Umatilla National Forest asks for the fullest co-operation in the mountains this summer in giving aid during probable fires and to meet all sanitation requirements

at the camps. The ranger states that he has been much pleased with the co-operation in the past and is looking forward to unanimous co-operation. Laws regarding sanitation regulations shall be enforced to the word during the coming summer.

La Grande Booster—La Grande is the best town in eastern Oregon and there are few in the state that "can hold a candle to it." This is the opinion of Herman Siegrist, merchant of La Grande, who was at the Benson hotel yesterday. Mr. Siegrist is an enthusiastic booster for his city. "La Grande is a payroll town and right now is prosperous due to the fact that there is employment for all," he said yesterday. "The mills around our section of the state, while not as large as many in other localities, are giving employment to many men and good wages are being paid. The flouring mills are also running to capacity and are giving steady employment to a large number of men."—Oregonian.

Auto Accidents Can Be Avoided, H. H. Franklin

"Most automobile accidents can be avoided," says H. H. Franklin, president of the Franklin Automobile company. Only a small proportion are caused by mechanical troubles, the rest by conditions over which motorists and pedestrians have control. One phase of the problem calls for the licensing of all drivers of motor vehicles under strict requirements covering a definite code of driving and traffic rules. The other phase calls for the assumption of the proper share of responsibility on the part of the pedestrian. "City streets and country roads have now come to be veritable railroads filled with the engines and modern traffic. If for no other reason than this, the pedestrian cannot safely ignore warning signals on the highway nor traffic rules on city streets. Busy streets can now be crossed safely by the pedestrian at street intersections only, and with the traffic. The streets must be kept clear for movement of vehicles. In preventing the play of children on the streets, the responsibility of parents is apparent. "Safety of traffic is not a case of pedestrians against motorist or vice versa. Each has certain well-defined rights and each is here to stay. All that is required is the exercise of common sense and good judgment on the part of both."

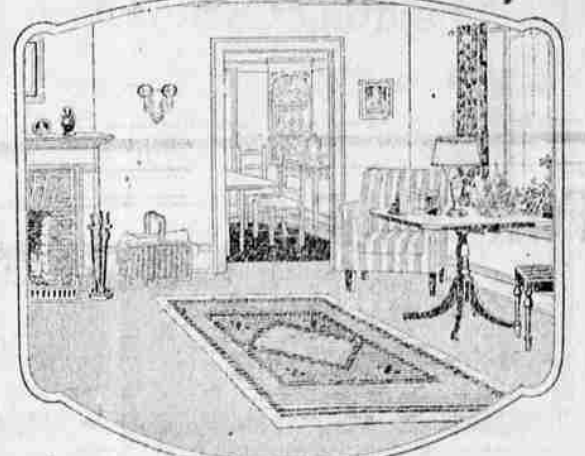
