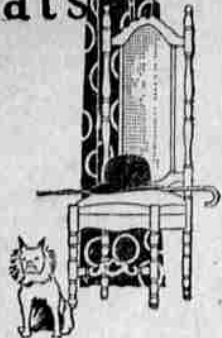

Oro Dell Hearing Is Concluded Yesterday

testified that the consideration for the road crossing near the bridge was the right to close a grade crossing, then existing at the old brick yard, which was closed after the other crossing was opened. Dr. H. R. Brown, present city commissioner, and commissioner at the time of the passing of the ordinance in question, stated that the railroad wanted them at that time to vacate certain parts of the streets for railroad facilities, with the consideration that the city was to have a crossing up for discussion before the ordinance was passed and that the ordinance was at that time deemed more feasible.

J. D. Slater, who was city attorney at the time of the passing of the ordinance in question, stated that the ordinance in its present form was passed and that one copy was sent the O.W. company. The ordinance had first been proposed by the railroad company, the matter then coming up for discussion before the commission, some features being added, changing the wording of the ordinance as originally proposed, which made it specifically read that the railroad was to install and maintain an over or under grade crossing at or near Oro Dell in return for the franchise that the city had given them and also that the present proposed overcrossing in at Oro Dell, according to Mr. Slater's testimony.

H. B. Baker, highway division engineer, was again called for testimony, and was asked if there was any plan he could suggest that would not be an inconvenience to people living near the grade crossing, that would give them direct communication with the Oregon Trail, when completed. He stated that by grading a road with five per cent grade, 700 feet to 1000 feet in length, that it would put them in direct communication with the Old Oregon Trail, the approximate cost of such steps being about \$500 or \$600.

Following Judge Phy's testimony, the hearing closed, about 5:30 o'clock. Accompanied by R. H. Ballock and W. C. Greese, the public service commission and their party left this morning for Enterprise to hold a hearing relative to some grade crossings in Wallowa county.

Cairo, Egypt, by an insect. Mystics Credulous. To the public at large the misfortune with which the civil had been regarded as a lamentable incident that might happen in any tropical climate such as that of Egypt. But to the credulous students of Egyptian mysticism, the news did not come as a surprise. Even before Lord Carnarvon was stricken with blood poisoning, announced as due to an insect bite, there had been talk of the curses laid by the ancient Egyptian mystic incantation on any who dared disturb the sleep of a pharaoh. After he was stricken, the old legends spread and hundreds were to be found, not before superstitions, who were ready to believe that the old Egyptian curse had fallen on the famous Englishman. There were some who even questioned whether it was an insect that dealt him the poisonous bite.

DOYLE GIVES OPINION
NEW YORK, April 5.—Sir Arthur Conan Doyle expressed the belief that an "elemental" brought into being by Egyptian occultism or the spirit of Tutankhamen, might have caused Carnarvon's death.
