WASHINGTON STATE TO BE TRACK HOST

PULLMAN, Wash., April 6.—The interscholastic track and field meet, to include all high schools east of the Cascade mountains, will be held at Washington State college May 5, and plans are being made to make the meet the biggest in the history of the school.

Invitations will be sent to all eastern Washington high schools. Several districts plan to hold elimination meets in April to select representative teams of that district for the W. S. C. interscholastic.

The first track meet of the season for the varsity will be held the second day when the W. S. C. final meet will meet the University of Idaho. Coaches of several high schools have already signified their intention of attending the meet.

IDAHO FIVE BEATEN IN NATIONAL PLAY

CHICAGO, April 6.—In a nip and tuck game that was twice tied in the second half the Kansas City high school entry in the national academic basketball tournament Thursday eliminated Weston, champions of Idaho, by a score of 33 to 23. Schmidt, Kansas left forward, won the game for his team when he made three baskets in a row within three minutes of the final whistle.

Kansas City led the Idaho team, 15 to 12 at the half, having been unable to give Schmidt chances for short times to basket under the goal as they did in their game Wednesday, owing to the close guarding of G. Coffman.
