FIRE PATROL REQUESTED
SALEM, April 5.—State forestry officials have sent resolutions to Oregon's representatives in congress and to attaches of the United States forest service asking that airplanes be assigned to this state during the coming forest fire season. If the planes are assigned to Oregon for fire patrol duty they will be stationed at Eugene.

The government some time ago requested the Oregon forestry officials to establish steel hangars on the Eugene airplane field, and this request is now under consideration. The proposed improvement would cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000 and would have to be paid for out of state funds.

WILL REVIVE AGED SILVER PRODUCER

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—Candellin, an old silver mining camp in western Nevada, which produced nearly \$20,000,000 in the latter part of the last century, is being worked again, according to the United States geological survey here.

In the early days the ore averaged \$20 or more to the ton, and it was

thought, when this high-grade ore "petered out" that the mine had ceased to be a paying proposition. But the progress made in metallurgy during the past few years has rendered possible the efficient mining of the low-grade ore.


COCAINE TAKEN IN RAID

ABERDEEN, Wash., Apr. 6.—Aberdeen police and federal officers, in a raid last night, seized a quantity of cocaine and arrested R. Ellis, a street

vendor of supposedly scientific literature and patent medicines, and a man giving his name as Eddie Larsen. The men, it is said, will be charged under the Beeler law, the first case of the kind to come under that law in this country. Ellis, it is said, claims to a specialist in medical matters, and has visited many cities on the north coast.
