SHOT IN BRAIN, HAS HEADACHES

ELY, Nev., April 7.—With a bullet imbedded in his brain, Martin Izazagarat, 28, a Spaniard, wounded in a shooting affair here February 17, is fully conscious, feels only

a slight headache, and is expected to recover.

Izazagarat, former service man, and said to have been in poor physical condition on account of shell shock, deserted his wife, Mary Ubalde, 30, also Spanish, about four months ago, ten days after their marriage here, and went to California. He then wrote to her, asking to be taken back, which she refused to do.

Returning to Ely, he engaged in an altercation with her at the lodging house she conducted. When she asked Etchebarren, a lodger, to go for the police, Izazagarat shot them both and, fleeing, turned the revolver on himself, inflicting head and abdominal wounds.

After a violent hemorrhage he seemed perfectly rational and complained of no pain, except that his head ached. He inquired for the others and was informed that they were both recovering.
