

# RADIO TO TOUT OREGON SCENES

### To Broadcast Scenic Wonders of State Through the Navy Radio, Is Plan Now Ready.

To broadcast the scenic wonders of Oregon and the natural resources of the state through Oregon radio stations in the United States navy, is the plan worked out by Lieutenant Commander H. E. Keer, in charge of the Oregon recruiting district, with W. P. Dodson, manager of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, and J. H. DeWyer, manager of the state chamber of commerce.

The plan is to broadcast in every town in the state, in general and in particular, to bring to the attention of the various state organizations throughout the state asking for cooperation in this plan.

More than 100 men from the Oregon district will be in the navy, each month. Practically all of these men are later assigned to duty on ships of the Pacific fleet, which bases in San Pedro and other southern California harbors. These tourists from all parts of the nation visit and come to see the ships.

Once aboard, a guide is detailed to show the visitors about. One of the first questions asked of the sailor is "where do you come from?"

By having the Oregon man primed on facts about their home towns it is planned to have them act as emissaries from the various communities, and by telling the visitors about it arouse their interest. As the majority of visitors are tourists bound for nowhere in particular, the chances of getting them to come to Oregon are very good.

In asking for cooperation from the local civic organizations, the Portland and state chambers request that they keep in contact with the men that come from their own respective communities. The local communities are asked to supply these men with booklets and pamphlets telling of the opportunities of those communities.

"When a man first goes in the navy, his patriotism takes the form of loyalty to his home town," Commander Keer said. "By the proposed plan, this loyalty will be fostered and not allowed to gradually die. And the community will aid itself by having its navy men acting as salesmen for their own communities."

Furthermore, a man shipping in the navy is very eager for news from his home town. Often he does not get this and sooner or later he will find other interests. By keeping him on the mailing list and sending him news and booklets that interest will be kept alive and soon he will be a real booster. That is what Oregon needs, especially boosters in other states and I don't know of a better place to start the boosting than southern California where the tourist crop is heavy.

"If an Oregon man can get one out of every ten tourists he meets to come to Oregon he has performed a valuable service for the state. But he cannot do this unless he is sold on the idea himself and interested in what is going on in his home town."

Letters to the various civic organizations in the state will be sent from Portland by the first of the week.

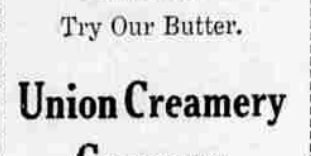

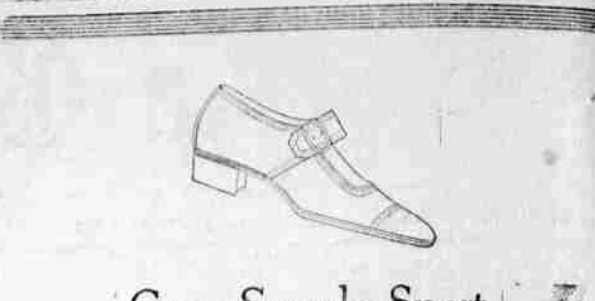
