## Class Meet May Be Held

Whether the interclass track meet will be held this week, preliminary to the Union-La Grande dual track meet to be held here Saturday, is a question that is being threshed out today in high school athletic circles. A decision is expected to be reached this afternoon. If the interclass meet is held it will very likely be either Wednesday or Thursday afternoon.

The party is expected back in La Grande about Friday.

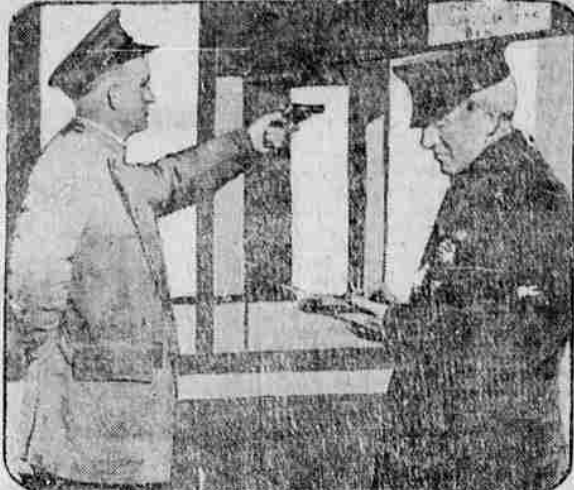

WALLOWA, Apr. 9.—Mrs. Harold Earle died at the hospital Monday morning of sleeping sickness. The lady, who was about twenty years of age, was brought in from the logging camp where her husband is employed. She was taken to Joseph for burial, where she has relatives.
