Powder Project Endorsed—

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Lower Powder Irrigation district in Baker last evening it was unanimously voted and a letter to A. P. Davis, director of the reclamation service, was drafted endorsing the project with the provision that the Union Pacific enter into a contract with the reclamation service to stand one-half the expense of moving the tracks of the railroad where they cross the site of the Thief Valley reservoir. The letter asked that Mr. Davis endorse the project with this understanding. A similar meeting of the irrigation committee of which Senator W. H. Strayer is chairman, was held yesterday afternoon at which resolutions were adopted by unanimous vote and the recommendations and actions of the committee are to be forwarded to Mr. Davis also.—Baker Democrat.

URGES ACTION TO INTENSIFY GIFT CAMPAIGN

less than one per cent of the population of Oregon. The total number of college-trained men and women in one generation is probably not above three per cent, whereas in the army and in all well-organized industries, the number of highly-trained people is at least one in eight, or 12 1/2 per cent, while, as the president point out, "The four years spent in college enlarge the capacity for production by an average of \$1,250 a year for 30 to 40 years." Particularly in a state of abundant and undeveloped resources, such as Oregon, he asserts, "a trained or educated man is a true technical knowledge at a premium," contending further that the urge for college education is "from the homes of the people and will not be denied. Their hope, their ambition, their joy in life, is in their children" and "they believe in the equality of opportunity without a system of public education provides and insist on it from primary school to university."

At the University of Oregon, according to the report, entrance requirements rigidly administered and a high and rising standard of class work have, for the first time, resulted in students from growing rapidly.

Deplores Conditions
 The president deplores the tragedy enacted when, through over-crowding and the "factory system" in education, the student falls and leaves college because he has been overlooked and his interests neglected. "Given reasonable preparation, the right instructors, and enough personal attention and inspiration," says President Campbell, "the normal boy or girl is almost certain to make a success of the college course. Human material is too valuable not to be given the best opportunity. With increasing numbers must come correspondingly increasing faculty, housing and equipment. The investment must keep pace with the numbers to be instructed."

Gift Campaign
 In the realization that the needed additional resources cannot be expected from the state for years, the movement for gifts was started last fall. A generous friend of the university, who remains anonymous, started the fund with a gift of \$10,000, which was supplemented by a subscription of \$20,000 from alumni and other friends of the university in Eugene, for the purpose of financing a campaign to obtain for the university \$100,000 in gifts in ten years. A small office building has been erected, and an office director, a field director, and an alumni secretary, with employees on full time. "In the first six months," the president tells the regents, "in addition to making a careful study of the field, both in Oregon and in the eastern states, an organization has been effected of the alumni in 18 counties of Oregon, an admirable monthly magazine, 'Old Oregon,' has been published, and gifts and bequests to them amount of more than \$50,000 have been secured. No intensive effort to secure gifts has been made, as it was thought best to take sufficient time to study the plans of campaign in other institutions before setting on a large way on the campaign in Oregon."

Cites Examples
 What other institutions have done along this line is cited in the report: Not less than \$150,000,000 has been given the universities during the last four years. "The city of Buffalo raised \$250,000 for its local university in an intensive campaign of ten days during the past year. The university of Michigan, has, during the past two years, had several gifts amounting to a million dollars each. The students and faculty of the University of Minnesota last fall subscribed \$50,000 toward a memorial building on the campus. Stanford university has just completed a fund of \$1,000,000 for its medical school. The University of California has for a number of years been receiving annually between \$1,000,000 and \$2,000,000 in gifts, the amount for this year being \$1,200,000 in value. Many of these gifts are in the form of buildings, and it has \$5,000,000 in invested funds derived from the same source."

University's Needs.
 Needs of the University of Oregon are summarized as follows: "A library, an auditorium, a science building, a building for housekeeping, a men's gymnasium, and a fine-arts building and museum, an infirmary, and the completion of the music building will all be pressing needs on the campus within the next five years. Additional land also should be secured before the prices become prohibitive. The athletic fields should be enlarged and improved. Within the next five years, five million dollars can be invested to the greatest advantage to the university. This money will in large measure have to be secured from gifts." The committee now in charge of the campaign stands ready to proceed intensively, if the regents approve.

In conclusion, President Campbell points out, "economical production, effective marketing, sound organization and financing, and the most complete utilization of our best natural resources, including power, fit perfectly into the scheme of education in our modern state institutions. Not only should the laboratories be utilized by the experts of the university staff, but they should be thrown open to the experts of private business organizations, and every assistance be rendered in solving directly the immediate problems of every enterprise in the state. "A small part even of the \$100,000,000 which goes into automobile upkeep in Oregon, and of the \$8,000,000 for the movies and other amusements might be directed to increase the \$2,000,000 which goes to higher education, with great gain to education and without serious sacrifice to anyone."
