FISHING SEASON OPEN APRIL 15

April 15th, the date set for the official opening of the fishing season in Oregon, is being eagerly awaited by followers of Isaac Walton in Union county. The greater share of the streams and rivers are too high and dry to permit fishing but several are promising of fair sport on the opening day.

Ladew creek, the tributaries to Catherine creek, near Union, Beaver and Five Points creeks are fairly clear and although not indicative of any record catches, several members of the fluky tribe may be caught in the present condition of those streams.

Beaver and Five Points creeks are not yet closed, the local sporting club awaiting notification from the state commission. These streams might be closed before April 15, but it is not expected until a later date.

CONTINUANCE GRANTED

CHICAGO, April 11.—Over vigorous protests from the Chicago crime commission, Judge Kerston of the circuit court Monday granted a continuance to William "Salter" Friedman, lightweight boxer, charged with murder. Friedman advanced the plea that he was matched in a bout with Benny Leonard, world's champion lightweight, on Memorial day for the title. The Chicago crime commission said Friedman's plea was fabrication.

MISHKAND WINS
SALT LAKE, April 11.—Able Mishkand, local 146-pound boxer, easily defeated Joe Goldie of Omaha, in six rounds here Monday night. Although Goldie was on his feet when the final round sounded the local fighter had the best of the affair throughout and was awarded the referee's decision.

BILL BRENNAN RETIRES
NEW YORK, April 11.—Bill Brennan of Chicago, heavyweight pugilist, long known as a trial horse for fighters aspiring to a bout with Champion Jack Dempsey, is through with the ring game, his lawyer, Joseph J. Jacobs announced Tuesday.

The announcement was made when Mr. Jacobs was being interviewed about a suit against the Mail & Express company, publishers of the New York Evening Mail, filed on behalf of Brennan.

Mr. Jacobs said Brennan was suing the Evening Mail for publication of an article charging he "laid down" in his recent bout with Luis Angel Firpo, of Argentina.

FIND PYRAMIDS NEAR CORVALLIS

CORVALLIS, Ore., Apr. 10.—"Baby pyramids" is the way Dr. John B. Horner, director of historical research in Oregon and head of the history department of the Oregon Agricultural college here, describes the mounds in which are found the remains of a pre-historic race that inhabited the region now Oregon in the stone age, or after the stone age. The latest discovery of one of these mounds was made recently at North Albany, in Linn county, not far from here.

The prehistoric burial mounds of Oregon," he said, "are baby pyramids belonging to a system of worship practiced through the Mississippi valley, developed into the stone pyramids of Mexico and reaching their culmination in the pyramids of Egypt."

When chance brought the plough of Clyde Peacock into contact with a mound builder's mortar on his North Albany farm, Peacock raised a crop that brought him more than the asparagus and onions he expected to grow on the ground this year. His excavations revealed skulls, skeletons, mortars, pestles, pipes, arrow heads, knives, bones and other curios. There he arrayed in his back yard and on the Sunday following the discovery he reaped \$500 by charging 25 cents for each of 2,000 persons who flocked to see the display.

The same impulse that caused the ancient Egyptians to fill their tombs with chariots, vases, foodstuffs and other things was responsible for the prehistoric inhabitants of Oregon placing the implements in the grave of their departed—the idea that they would be needed by the spirits in the world beyond, according to Dr. Horner. He said the skulls and skeletons were in unusually good state of preservation owing to the fact that they had been covered with charcoal, evidence of the funeral rites of the fire worshippers.

Interclass Meet on Today

As the Observer goes to press, four track teams, representing the freshmen, junior, sophomore and senior classes of the La Grande high school, are competing for interclass track and field honors at the fairgrounds. A decision was reached yesterday afternoon to hold the meet today and promptly at 3 o'clock the 100-yard dash will be on.

Fourteen events are on the list today. The sprints, including the 100, 220 and 440-yard dashes, the runs, 880-yard and mile and the relay, the hurdles, 120 high and 220 low hurdles, and the field events, consisting of the running broad and high jumps, the pole vault, the javelin, discus and the shotput are all on the schedule today.

Little is known of the respective strength of the various classes. Both the juniors and seniors are listed as favorites, with little to choose between them and the sophomores are more or less the dark horse of the meet. The freshman team, also sure of taking several points, is not counted on as a winner.
