MACHINE MADE WILL DISSECT HUMAN CELLS

CHICAGO, April 10.—A micro-visualization apparatus, governed by finely adjusted screws, whose work is so delicate as to enable it to dissect living human cells which are actually invisible to the naked eye, has been perfected by Professor C. E. Tharaldsen of the department of zoology of Northwest university, according to an announcement made at the university today.

"For years scientists have been making repeated attempts to break through the barriers surrounding the invisible protoplasm which make up the human body, on the theory that once the complete basic cell is perfectly understood, the control of the greater machine will be vastly expedited," says the announcement, which adds: "The new invention accomplishes this."
 The little device can be held in the palm of one hand. It is of brass, with various screws manipulating the arms, which in turn govern glass needles and pipettes that literally cut the living cells which are suspended in a hanging drop of nutrient fluid under the lens of a microscope.

"This machine is an improvement of the Barber pipette and also of the Chambers apparatus," explained Prof. Tharaldsen. "It renders it possible for the scientist to remove certain portions of a living human cell, and see keep the remaining living protoplasm in its natural state. By means of the pipettes or glass tubes I can inject various chemicals directly into the protoplasm of these cells and therefore study their effect, under the lens of the microscope. The machine also is proving valuable in isolating pure cultures of bacteria by a much more rapid method than now commonly employed."

Asked as to the significance of the invention, Prof. Tharaldsen continued: "During the last half century it has been apparent that the key to all problems of the functioning of the human body must be sought in the protoplasm of the human cells. These minute bodies are the units of which all the larger parts are constructed. Each one contains a chemical engine which of itself contributes a vital bit to the functioning of the entire body. The condition of the human body whether in health or in disease, is but the external expression of the more subtle force within these minute cells. Studies in the past have largely been confined to the observation of dead and fixed tissues, but in the last 15 years there have been repeated attempts to dissect the living human protoplasm and to develop study under conditions of complete dissection. This our little machine renders wholly possible and practicable."

A year ago Prof. Tharaldsen invented a paraffin oven which greatly simplified the work of research in laboratories. None of his inventions, he says, will be sold for his personal profit, but will be turned over to humanity for whatever good use they will serve.

IRA STURGESS IS DEAD IN BAKER

BAKER, April 11.—Ira B. Sturges, a highly respected citizen of this city, died at his home on Sixth street Tuesday morning following a few days' illness from lobular pneumonia. Mr. Sturges was born in Norwalk, Ohio, January 18, 1845, where he spent his boyhood days. In June, 1863 he enlisted in Company B 25th Ohio regiment and with this regiment took part in 14 battles during the Civil war. In recognition of his loyal and faithful services he was promoted to the rank of sergeant which he held with honor until the close of the war. On September 26th, 1869, Mr. Sturges was married to Mary Sims,
