## NORTH POWDER NEWS

The long expected meeting of the president and officers of the Union Pacific system railroad and the Baker project people came about on April 2. The meeting was held in Baker at the chamber of commerce hall. Carl R. Gray, Judge B. S. Lovett and other head officials of the railroad were present. Mr. Gray and those present understand the situation and the proposition was made to the committee of the irrigation project that the railroad will share the expenses at the rate of 50-50 in moving the track so as not to interfere with the project.

This seemed to satisfy all present and the respective committees will report back to their respective head officers with the recommendation that the proposition be accepted. It is now up to the reclamation service to accept or reject and the railroad has made a very fair proposal in offering to share the expenses.

It is expected that the reclamation will soon make a statement as to what will be done and we will know whether we will get the project started or not. L. B. Russell, mayor of North Powder, and Ed Ledbetter were present at the meeting from North Powder. If the reclamation service can see their way to accept work will start in a short time.
