What is Home without a Garden?

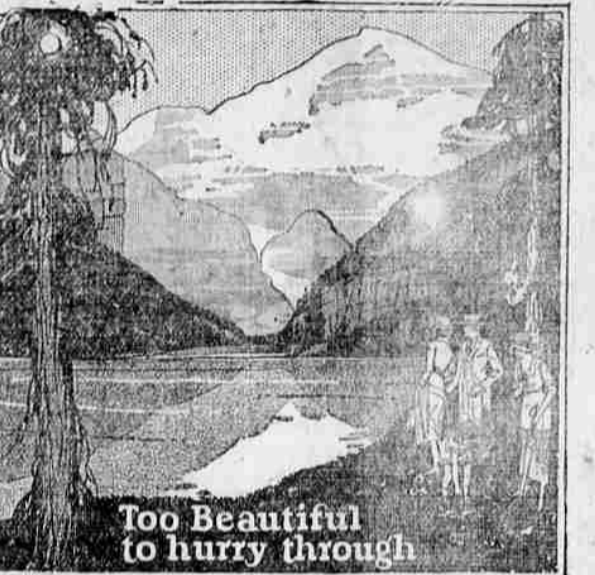
IF A GARDENER DON'T BE A DUB
