"BRASS COMANDMENTS" WM. FAHNTUN'S LATEST

Drama and William Fahntun—There
is a combination that becomes strong-
er with every picture in which the Star

ROYAL BARGE FOR MARION DAVIES IN GREAT PHOTOPLAY

Star Makes Impassioned Entrance in "When Knighthood Was in Flower"
Marion Davies as Princess Mary
Tudor in "When Knighthood Was in
Flower," "Cosmopolitan's" splendid
picture for Paramount of Chas.

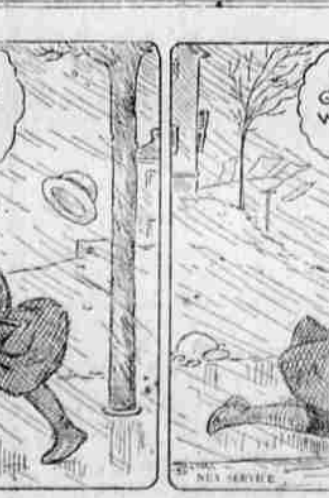
