OLIVER SHAFER IS NOW AT REST

Another answered the call of the Death Angel Thursday when Oliver Shafer passed on at the age of 85 years. Funeral services will be held at Island City tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock with the G. A. R. in charge of the services. The remains are at the Reynolds & Zimmerman funeral service parlors.

Mr. Shafer's death came as a great shock to his many friends, who are mourning his passing on. He was born at Warren, Trumbull county, Ohio, March 5, 1848, moving to West Bend, Washington county, Wisconsin, when but an infant, thence going to Iowa when about eleven years of age. He enlisted in company A, 46th Regulars of the Iowa Infantry on May 9, 1864, and was honorably discharged on September 23, 1868. He then moved to Missouri in 1869 and came from Missouri to Oregon in 1874, thence going to Texas in 1895, to Colorado in 1918, and back to Oregon on February 10, 1923. Mr. Shafer was married to Sarah F. Walsinger on November 8, 1885, who passed on December 20, 1886. To this union was born two children, who have both been slain by death. Mr. Shafer married January 21, 1899, Lillian A. Hotchkiss, three children surviving their father from this union. They are Carlos J. Shafer, of La Grande; Ada O. Shafer, of Spunero, Colo.; and Mrs. Alice May Telohr, of Montrose, Colo.
