INCAS DESIRED POINTED SKULLS

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Apr. 14

—An Inca Indian vase, beautifully colored and delicately constructed, as artificially shaped human skull, was

pre-Inca vases and jugs, bone heads and other unique relics have been received at the University of Utah Museum from Caracas, Bolivia, South America. The donor is Victor J. Hampton, a former mining engineer and student at the school.

The artificially shaped skull is perhaps the most interesting object sent by Mr. Hampton. In a letter he explained that it was the custom of the Inca Indians in the thirteenth century to possess a pointed, angular skull. In order to obtain this mark of distinction, binding of the skull in infancy was the practice.

It was these same Indians, according to Mr. Hampton, who practiced trepanning of the bone in the cranium to permit the escape of certain spirits supposed to be within. For the operation flint and bronze tools were used and the coca plant, from which cocaine is derived, was eaten to deaden the pain.

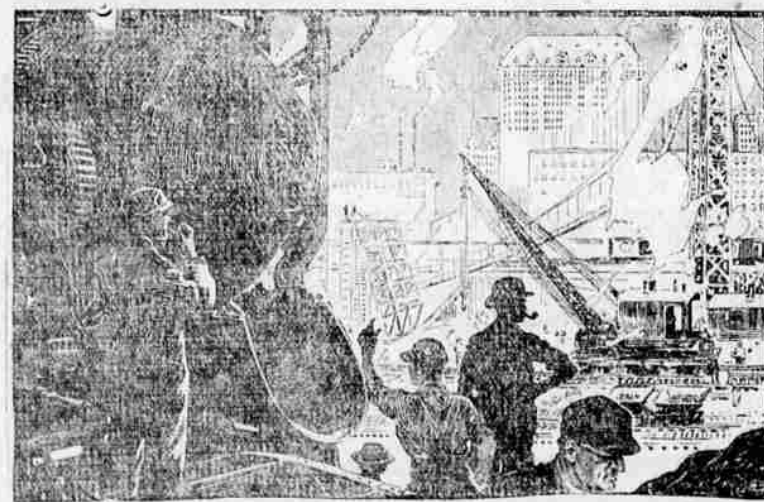
