MINE EXHIBITS

(By Associated Press) PHOENIX, Ariz., Apr. 17.—Records and exhibits weighing approximately half a ton in the case of the Iron Cap Copper company against the Arizona Commercial Mining Company, both located in the Copper Hill district at Globe, Ariz., were filed in the state supreme court recently in connection with an appeal of the case.

Most appeals are received in the supreme court through the mail but this one was delivered by express and consisted of eight large boxes and numerous miscellaneous bundles. The Iron Cap-Arizona Commercial case involves the top, or apex, of ore bearing lodes and veins, it being the contention of the Arizona Commercial company that several of the

lode claims of the Iron Cap company, the appeal of Judge G. W. Shute of Globe holding the Iron Cap company to be the sole owner of the lodes. The appeal was brought by the Arizona Commercial company from and claims under dispute.

William Robertson and brother, A. Robertson, finished the wood contract in Gibbon and returned to their home in the Starkey country.

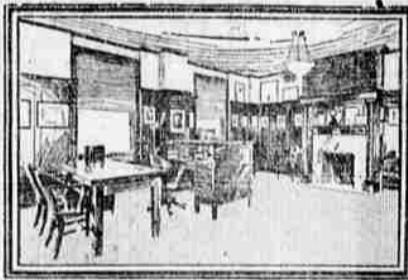
Anna Green is employed on the Williams' ranch building a pasture fence.
