**Autos Crash—No One Hurt**  
 Last evening a Hupmobile driven by Miss Pearl Cyr and a Buick driven by Miss Theda Bollens crashed together at the city's death trap—Fourth and O avenues—with rather severe injuries to both cars but with no one injured. Attention of the Hupmobile driver was attracted by a Ford coming down the O avenue hill, it is claimed, and the Buick and the Hup hit before either driver realized it.

**Several Arrests**  
 Several more arrests and convictions are credited to the police department today. Billy Olson, Charles Calwell, William Mayhoad and Eliot La Frenier were all arrested on charges of drunkenness and were fined \$15.

**Asked to Co-Operate**  
 Owing to the indifference displayed by some motorists in regard to the hay quarantine it may be necessary, according to H. H. Weatherpoon, state agricultural commissioner, to place a barrier at the quarantine station, opposite the cemetery. It was hoped that this action would not be necessary as the entire situation was thoroughly discussed and the status was prevailed upon to appropriate a sum of money to fight the alfalfa weed. According to W. J. Brook, who has charge of the quarantine station, a large majority of the autoists consent very willingly to the short delay necessary for an examination. Mr. Brooks states that while he has met some objection from daylight travellers, most of the indifference comes from the joy riders at night, who pay very little attention to the stop signals. The quarantine officials, ought either to be enforced rigidly or else abandoned and if the people of Baker would co-operate the enforcement would be an easy matter and the benefits far reaching.—Baker Herald.

**AUTO ACCIDENT FATAL**  
 PENDLETON, Apr. 17.—Little Verma Bittner, 10 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam C. Bittner, who live near the Umatilla reservation agency, died last night at St. Anthony's hospital at 7:15 o'clock, as the result of a fatal accident yesterday afternoon, when a passing car struck her as she stepped from the school bus in front of her home, and crushed her horribly. B. D. Kandel of Spokane, the driver of the car, is held at the county jail without bonds, pending the action of a coroner's jury, likely to act today.
