SHERRY—LAST DAY There is no question as to the great production, "Way Down East," and at the Sherry theatre this splendid and thrilling amplification and adaptation of the famous play of the same name is sufficient to crowd the auditorium twice daily. However, the success of this picture here is but a repetition of New York's approval, marked by attendance surpassing that for the corresponding weeks in the history of Griffith's "The Birth of a Nation."

"Way Down East" has a human story to tell, and there is a straightforward and effective method employed, with a culmination of tremendous power. Indeed nothing has ever been seen on stage or screen to equal the thrilling intensity of the scenes depicting the wanderings of Anna Moore through the snow-storm and over ice and the rescue of the hopeless young woman by David Bartlett as she lies on an ice floe on the brink of a fall. Realism is here brought to the ultimate and the scenes are presented with sincerity by Lillian Gish and Richard Barthelmess.

"Way Down East" represents the most careful attention to detail with some admirable landscapes and with scenes that show the countryside at all seasons of the year. Little touches such as are distinctively Griffith have poetic value and there is a most liberal proportion of fun, sometimes of a boisterous sort, but always in the spirit of the tale. The barn dance with Creighton Hale as a bewildered dancing professor is one of the big fun hits of the piece. In the cast are Vivian Guden, Burr McIntosh, Kate Bruce, Lowell Sherman, Florence Short, Mary Hay, George Neville, Mrs. Morgan Belmont, a social leader of New York and Newport and others. The picture is shown to the accompaniment of a special score that is dramatic and colorful and that enhances the showing. Some entirely new effects devised by Griffith are to be noted.

"THE FLAMING HOUR" COMING TO ARCADE

"What's the story about?" is the usual question of a theater patron before going to see a new production. Sometimes the stories are simply adventure plots, fascinating, but meaningless, and sometimes they are stories of real life with a genuine human interest and a meaning that appeals to everyone.

"The Flaming Hour," a Universal attraction coming to the Arcade theatre Wednesday only with Frank Mayo in the starring role and Helen Ferguson opposite him, belongs to the second class. It combines interesting action with a theme that is full of meaning for two out of three men.

"OREGON TRAIL" WEDNESDAY

An interesting story about Abraham Lincoln is told in the third chapter of "The Oregon Trail," the Universal chapter play of the Oregon Trail's history which will be shown at the Arcade theatre, where the third episode comes Wednesday with Art Acord in the starring role. Lincoln, at the time of the Black Hawk war, enlisted and was commissioned as an officer. It is said that he wasn't quite clear on some of the commands and disciplinary phraseology, and particularly on the method of getting a body of soldiers through a gate. He solved this problem in this situation by ordering his men outside a stockade and to "aim, load and fall in on the other side."

Jefferson Davis was also an officer in the Black Hawk Indian war, a comrade in arms of the man who was later to be president of the United States while he was to be chief of the Confederate state. Historical facts are prominently featured in "The Oregon Trail," for which the research, accepted over six months. Supporting Acord are Louise Lorraine, Duke H. Lee, Jim Cooney and Ruth Rogers.
