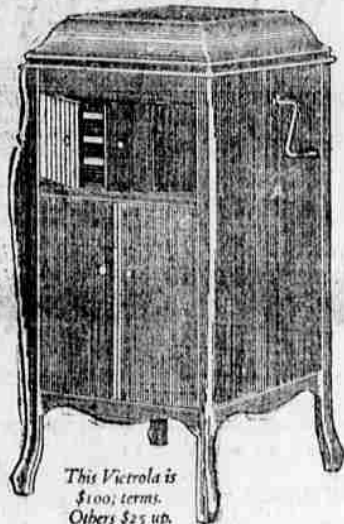
La Grande, having been here last year on a lecture tour, which later took him to eastern points. It was on his return through the west on the lecture tour that he visited Albany.

CHICAGO CANNOT MAINTAIN SUIT

Tribune was the first on record in America in which a municipality sought to restrict criticism of its corporate acts. It resulted from news and editorial articles published in the Tribune.

The bill alleged that the city had been damaged in that the articles had kept investors from buying bonds of the municipality and had influenced contractors and others who had business dealings with the city, to demand onerous terms of payment. It was alleged that the city's credit had been reduced and that in this respect it had suffered as would a private individual or an industrial corporation under like circumstances.

The bill asserted that the city was suing its corporate rather than its government capacity, and to bring out the distinction, pointed out the numerous ways in which it conducted business, through its municipally-owned waterworks, its department of streets and alleys, and its purchase of supplies for fire, police and other departments.

Attorneys for the newspaper demurred to this pleading, and the findings of the lower court on October 15, 1921, was that the demurrer was well founded. The attorneys for the newspaper argued that the city could not separate itself from its public functions in order to act in the capacity of a private corporation. They also declared that if the right to file such a suit were upheld, it could be in direct contravention of the free press guarantees of the federal and state constitutions.

Judge Harry C. Fisher, of the circuit court of Cook county, upheld the contentions of the defense in every particular. He quoted Section 41, Article II, of the Illinois constitution, providing that "every person may freely speak, write and publish on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that liberty" and that the truth, when published with good motives and for justifiable ends, shall be sufficient defense for libel. The judge said that legitimate restraints on freedom of speech had been narrowed down to four heads—blasphemy, immorality, sedition and defamation. He dismissed the first two as not involved in the suit, pointed out that counsel for the city had admitted that the Tribune's articles were not defamatory and then held that defamation could exist only if the city could, by some legal fiction, be regarded as a private corporation.

He then said that no decisions of Illinois courts in which municipalities were involved, had ever held that a city might at will throw off its character of a public governmental agency. He said that the constitutional restraints against interference with freedom of expression applied with as much force to a city as it did to the state or any other governmental subdivision.

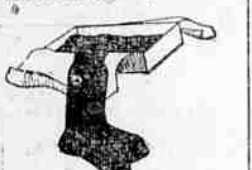
