Ball Season to Open May 6, at Baker

Manager Crews Asks for Practice on First Sunny Afternoon; Schedule Being Drawn Up.

Following the announcement, received from Union yesterday to the effect that the Federal City would enter a baseball team in the proposed four team intermountain league, comes a call for practice from Manager W. C. Crews, of the Pirates.

"The first sunny afternoon will open the practice," he stated today. "At present the fairgrounds are in a muddy state, prohibitive to early season practice, but as soon as the weather turns sunny and the ground hardens, the baseball squad will be out every evening."

"At this time," he continued, "I wish to again state that we want every ball player in the city to turn out. The team will not be selected this year until every man has been given equal try-out and no man will be sure of a position until he has demonstrated that he is qualified for the same. Even then, he must continue to perform in such a manner as to leave no doubts as to his ability to play his position, in order to keep from being shunted to the bench for a better man."

With crews at the helm, and a big turn out assured, La Grande fans are looking forward to the biggest baseball year that the Pirates have ever had.

Season Opens May 6th.

Although the schedule has not yet been drawn up in entirety, the season will open May 6th, the Pirates taking on the Colts at Baker and the Farmers crossing bats with the Federals at Union. La Grande will meet Cove the second Sunday, probably here.

As the schedule is expected to be arranged, it will provide for a game here every other Sunday throughout the season, which will be twelve weeks in length. Four games will be played with each team, and providing no postponed games remain to be played off the season will come to a close July 22.

The problem of drawing up the schedule is in the hands of Baker and the by-laws will be drawn up by La Grande. Following their completion they will be submitted to each club and after being approved will become effective.

All four cities are expected to put on close nines this year. La Grande has all of her last year's men and many more. Baker is showing more baseball enthusiasm than ever before. Cove is busy as a hen setting on 40 eggs and Union is living up to the job of putting a first class team onto the playing field with a vim.

FISHERMEN LAND 500-POUND FISH

NAMPA, Id., April 21.—Nampa's dean of fishermen, A. C. Garber, and Jim Bernard shared honors in the capture of a 500-pound sturgeon on Snake river Sunday morning. The fishing monster, which was about 12 feet in length, was hooked on a throw line in Snake river at the mouth of Reynolds creek.

To land the big fellow a wagon was backed into the river and the fish hauled onto the wagon by six husky men. The head of the fish alone weighed 150 pounds. Live eels were used for bait.

This is the first big sturgeon to be landed this year, though a number were taken from the Snake river every season. The fresh Snake river sturgeon is considered a great delicacy by many and always finds a ready sale at prices ranging from 15 to 25 cents per pound.

Many local anglers tried their luck at the reservoir Sunday but not with much success. It will take another week or two of warm weather before fishing is good there, Mr. Garber says. If anglers can restrain their desire for a mess of perch that long it will be well to wait. Mr. Garber says for this in the spawning season and the fish are in poor condition for eating.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that the Commission of the City of La Grande, Oregon, proposes and intends to improve District No. 123 in the City of La Grande, Oregon, in accordance with the plans and specifications thereof heretofore adopted by the Commission, and that the report of the committee on estimates for said improvement is now on file in the office of the Recorder of the City of La Grande, Oregon; that the said Commission has set Wednesday, the 16th day of May, 1923, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., of said day, at the Commission Room in the City building in La Grande, Oregon, as the time and place when and where said Commission will meet and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance of any persons against said proposed improvement and the proposed assessment therefor against the property to be benefited thereby in said district.

That the boundaries of the district to be improved and benefited by the said proposed improvement as finally adopted by the Commission are as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on the center line of Adams Avenue 212.9 feet northwest from the center line of Hemlock Street; thence at right angles to said center line in a northeasterly direction to the center of the alley in Block 110, Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence in an easterly direction to the most southerly corner of Lot 6, said Block 110; thence in a northeasterly direction along the lot line between Lots 6 and 7, said Block 110 to the southerly line of Jefferson Avenue; thence in a northeasterly direction to the most southerly corner of lot 7, Block 117, Chaplin's Addition to the City of La Grande; thence in a northeasterly direction following the lot line between lots 7 and 8, said Block 117 and its extension to the center line of the O. W. R. & N. Company's main line right of way; thence on a curve to the right following the center line of the O. W. R. & N. 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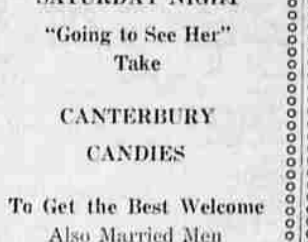
