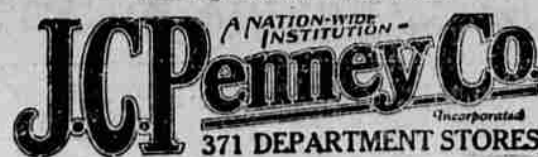

350 SENIORS TO GRADUATE FROM OREGON

EUGENE, Apr. 21.—Approximately 350 seniors will be graduated from the University of Oregon on Commencement Day, June 25th, a marked increase over the number in former graduating classes, according to Carlton Spence, registrar. The 1922 graduating class numbered 256. The total numbers in other recent classes were: 1921, 226; 1920, 200; 1919, 144; 1918, 164; 1917, 137; 1916, 123; and 1915, 107.

Dr. Henry B. Ward, professor of zoology at the University of Illinois and national president of Sigma Xi, honorary science society, will be the Commencement speaker at the University. Dr. Edward Ellery, dean of the faculty of Union College, Schenectady, N. Y., and national secretary of Sigma Xi, will deliver the Baccalaureate sermon, June 24. His topic will be, "The Spiritual Evolution of Man."

Dr. Ward is a graduate of Williams College and Harvard and was dean of the school of medicine of the University of Nebraska before he joined the Illinois faculty. He was formerly president of the Association of American Medical Colleges, and has written widely on scientific subjects.

Both of the visitors will install the Oregon Chapter of Sigma Xi while at the university. The installation ceremony will take place in the Woman's building on the afternoon of June 22. The Sigma Xi banquet will be held in the evening.

Meet At Hot Lake. At the close of the Union meeting, the executive committee, as the guests of Dr. W. T. Phyl, met at Hot Lake and prepared many important matters relative to the program.

Budget Adopted. A budget was adopted for immediate traveling expenses, mats, and cuts, sanitary construction on the grounds, building of water systems, publicity, that totaled \$6400. The fund is distributed as follows: Pendleton, La Grande and Baker, each \$1500; Union and Enterprise, each \$400; Ontario, Joseph, Wallowa, each \$200; North Powder, Haines, Huntington and Elgin, each \$100; Hot Lake, \$50; Wallowa Lake Amusement Park and Leslie Amusement Park, each \$50.

Budget Underwritten. The entire budget was voted to be underwritten, each town in its own way to subscribe its amount. No steps will be taken until the full amount is underwritten, as a precaution against bad weather on the day of the pageant.

An immediate call will be issued to each community for 25 per cent of its quota. It is not anticipated that the full amount of the budget will be required or that any material additional calls will be issued for subscriptions.

According to postoffice inspectors there were 313 companies merged into the Doctor Cook company. There were capitalized for \$388,861,000 and sold \$90,000,000 in stock. The Revco company merged 125 companies with a capital stock of \$199,000,000 and stock sold amounting to \$35,000,000, according to the inspectors.

The Pilgrim company merged 20 companies which had sold \$7,000,000 in stock, it was said.

In making public the figures, United States Attorney Zweifel said the investigation showed there was an average of a stockholder for every \$100 of stock sold. This would give 704,450 investors in the companies named in the indictments and about 1,360,000 investors in the merged companies, or a total of 2,064,450 persons.
