BAKER SIGNS PETITION
BAKER, Ore., April 24.—Fifteen persons willing to sign the petition seeking a referendum vote on the state income tax law, passed at the last session of the legislature, are in a way, according to Harry Sheppard, who is in charge of the petition here. He reports the required number of signatures sought here has been practically obtained. If Mr. Sheppard's experience is a criterion, Baker voters apparently are anxious to have the income tax measure submitted to popular vote at a special state election not later than May 28, as provided by the petition.

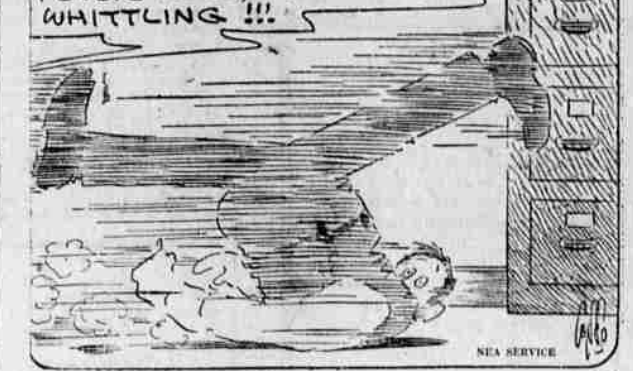
